From 1944 to the late 1970s, the Direct Grant system enabled hundreds of Old Bradfordians to enjoy a BGS education - lives forever changed for the better as a result. With the demise of the Direct Grant system, and the subsequent abolition of the government-funded Assisted Places scheme in 1997, we are increasingly reliant on the generosity of Old Bradfordians to ensure that others can enjoy the same education as you did, irrespective of background.

BGS has always been a catalyst for talented individuals to do great things. As we look to the future, we want to ensure this remains so for the next generation.

BGS MUST BE ACCESSIBLE TO ALL TALENTED PUPILS, REGARDLESS OF BACKGROUND OR CIRCUMSTANCE

Each year, we receive applications from around 180 talented pupils. Almost half of all applicants request an Assisted Place. However, we are only able to offer up to 10 Assisted Places each year.

Many talented children are forced to turn down an offer of place owing to a lack of funding. Children who would enrich BGS. Children whose background and experiences will ensure that our school is as diverse and multi-faceted as the world outside our gates. The 1662 Campaign seeks to address this need by doubling the number of pupils who receive Assisted Places each year.

THE 1662 CAMPAIGN: A VISIONARY UNDERTAKING

With your help, we can advance our Founders' values and remain true to the vision of our 1662 Royal Charter.

Old Bradfordians have always been generous to School. From those who rallied in the wake of a global depression to ensure the construction of our current school site, to the optimism of the Hoc Age Campaign which saw many lives changed for the better thanks to Assisted Places. We wouldn't have made such an impact without your support – thank you.

We currently provide ten new pupils each year with Assisted Places, thanks to the generosity of Old Bradfordians and friends. The 1662 Fund was launched with the aim of building upon this remarkable support.

The 1662 Campaign seeks to double the number of pupils we can support and provide Assisted Places for at least 20% of our school population. To meet this urgent and growing need, ongoing regular support is critical. Whether a fully sponsored Assisted Place, or a monthly Direct Debit, your support will transform lives.

Looking further ahead, we also have ambitious plans to grow a true endowment fund which will yield income for Assisted Places in perpetuity.

I enjoyed captaining the Cross-Country team, singing in the choir, chairing the Modern Languages Society but, more than anything, I revelled in the excellent language teaching. From BGS, I progressed to Oxford to read Russian & German.

"BGS was the launchpad to me developing into the person I am today. I was given a bursary to attend BGS, as I am from a low income single parent family. I would never, and I mean never, have gone to university and got to where I am today without the incredible teachers and support from BGS. Now a dentist, the determination and drive I learnt at BGS has endured. Last October I set up a charity called Happy Teeth Outreach, which educates trainee dentists and supports children with special educational needs or who are affected by the refugee crisis. In 2020, the charity won a national award for outstanding innovation. None of this would have been possible without BGS."

HOW TO CONTRIBUTE

Regular gifts

Giving regularly can make smaller amounts add up to a significant donation over time. Regular donations also allow us to plan for the future. Regular gifts can be made by Direct Debit on a monthly, quarterly or annual basis.

Single gift

A single gift, large or small, will have an immediate impact and help to grow The 1662 Fund. Single gifts can be made by cheque, Charities Aid Foundation (CAF) Voucher or debit/credit card.

Gift Aid

If you are a UK taxpayer, you can make your gift go further through Gift Aiding your donation. For every £1 you give by single or regular donations, we are able to, as a registered charity, reclaim 25p from HM Revenue & Customs. Higher rate taxpayers can also claim additional relief on their donations through Gift Aid; as the enclosed overview highlights some indicative examples.

Leaving a legacy

Legacy gifts enable you to make an enduring difference. If you choose to support The 1662 Fund in your Will, your gift will become part of the school's Assisted Places endowment, securing the provision of Assisted Places for future generations of BGS pupils.

Stocks, shares, land, or buildings

Gifts of stocks, shares, land, or buildings can be a particularly taxeffective means of donating to The 1662 Fund. Donors who give in this way are given income tax relief on the full current market value of the asset and will also benefit from savings on Capital Gains Tax.

Payroll and matched giving

Payroll giving, also known as Give As You Earn, enables you to give directly from your pre-tax salary. Each £1 given will cost a basic taxpayer 80p and a higher rate taxpayer 60p. A number of companies will also match the charitable gifts of their employees, doubling the value of your gift. To see if your organisation offers one or both schemes, contact your human resources department.

If 8 Old Bradfordians donated £1,662 each year, over a period of seven years, together you would provide enough support for a full Assisted Place.

International giving

If you live outside the UK and pay taxes in your country of residence, you may be able to make your gift more tax efficient through organisations such as Transnational Giving Europe and the British Schools and Universities Foundation.



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"I attended BGS on a County Minor Scholarship from 1950 to 1956; the realisation that someone like me would no longer be able to afford to attend BGS encouraged my wife Eleanor and I to become involved in supporting pupils at BGS. It was an emotionally rewarding experience for us both - and one which brought us closer to the BGS family, while we live in America.

We have met with the pupils we had supported, now university graduates – a joy and a privilege. As a donor, I can say that this is a two-way street: not only do the pupils benefit, but also the donors, for whom it generates a real sense of purpose."
