



Virtual Speech Day 2021

Headmaster's Speech

It remains an honour and a privilege to lead BGS, particularly at this moment in our history. On days like today when we take stock of the many laudable activities and achievements of our pupils, we are filled with justifiable grounds for hope for the future. I am brim-full of pride, admiration and affection for our pupils. and for my colleagues too, who have met, and continue to meet, the challenges of the pandemic. With the understanding and support of parents and the wider BGS family, I firmly believe that our School will go forwards strongly whatever comes next, 'flourishing in adversity' as one respected OB and former teacher put it.

BGS had to adjust quickly to a new school routine when lockdown and remote education first took hold in 2020. We were determined early on to sustain pastoral, academic and co-curricular provision, and mimic as far as was practicable the rhythm of a normal school day. At the same time, we understood it would be beneficial to deliver age appropriate programmes, begin steadily with remote education in order to leave no one behind and allow headroom for incremental improvement to keep things fresh.

We also sought to deliver a degree of flexibility recognising that both pupils and teachers would be facing many various and mounting pressures. Meanwhile families and friends were distancing, our people were falling ill and sadly some of us lost loved ones. Balancing professional and personal lives was far from easy for BGS employees and families alike and it remains difficult for many. The test, educational, operational and commercial, is ongoing. But it is a test that we are meeting.

Long serving US politician, Alan K Simpson said: 'If you have integrity, nothing else matters. If you don't have integrity, nothing else matters'. I've quoted these words before and they continue to resonate as I contemplate the manner in which all of us, you and I alike, have conducted ourselves of late.

It has been a struggle. Anxieties remain, for example surrounding Teacher Assessed Grades (or TAGs for short) and the awarding of fair and meritocratic qualifications. Through it all, both our support and teaching colleagues have worked incredibly hard to safeguard as best we can the health and welfare of our young people, whilst at the same time providing continuity of high-guality education. We have pulled out all the stops and had to move fast, often in the face of changing and sometimes apparently inconsistent guidance.

I believe that Bradford Grammar School has supported the national cause, demonstrated character and astonishing resilience during the pandemic. By necessity there has been a muscular element to our meeting of recent and present conditions. But we are kind, patient, empathetic and ultimately supportive of each other too. This balance of gualities will continue to see us through, even though we are now somewhat weather beaten by it all. With that in mind, my most sincere praise and respect is reserved for our young people, and in particular those who have once again been forced to navigate the cancellation of public exams. Looking ahead, challenges are inevitably morphing into opportunities for development and growth, and there is no question that BGS is in great shape to embrace these in the future.

But cast your gaze more widely and there is a gathering concern that speaks of lost learning, a lost generation, teachers and a notional army of tutors plugging deepening gaps, bridging a gulf between the most disadvantaged children and their peers. A crisis. Bleak prospects for blighted youth. No one denies the worrying truth that education for some school children has been severely disrupted during the pandemic. The dominant talk of disadvantage and future detriment is concerning, but it does not, I would suggest, provide a truly comprehensive narrative.

Over the course of long periods of remote learning and much altered school routines, our young people, not just at BGS, have successfully completed courses on time and demonstrated the acquisition and understanding of new knowledge and skills. They have discussed, created, experimented, cooperated, exercised and enjoyed a virtual programme of lessons, co-curricular clubs and activities. For many, school life has remained busy and rich. Much valuable and secure learning has taken place, some of which, for example in the fields of digital capability and confidence, executive function and independence has prospered, although we accept the learning curve has been steep. It would be helpful, I think, to acknowledge that things have been gained, not just lost in the world of education these past months.

Talk of missed lessons, academic shortfalls and hard-hit mental health is justified in many contexts and will require a collective effort to address. No one can deny this, and all schools must collaborate and enter in partnerships to do their bit. But let us also champion our young people, the qualities they have shown and their achievements. They ought to be a source of national pride. Those aforementioned TAGs, whatever their strength, will never tell the whole story. I'm talking about work ethic, character and sprit. I'm talking about integrity.

In accordance with tradition, we say goodbye today to Senior School staff who have left or are leaving this year and acknowledge their contribution to BGS life. Please forgive me if I miss anyone out, which is possible as this piece to camera is being filmed in advance of the end of term.

Thank you, Sports Graduate Assistant Alex Percival who will soon take up a PGCE place. Nick Hindle began at BGS in a similar capacity and it has been lovely to retain his services for an extra twelve months. Sports Teacher Gabby Leeson has also stayed on for a little longer than was initially anticipated, for that we are grateful. Oliver Stokes, our Music Graduate Assistant, has had an equally positive impact and we wish him every success as he too begins a PGCE.

Thanks go to BGS nurse Kelly Mistry who has provided a helping hand to students and staff alike, Gareth Openshaw and Helen Edwards who have provided maternity cover, and also to Biology Technician Rebecca Allington, German Language Assistant Jana Hopley and IT Manager Andy Birch who played a vital role when teaching and learning and wider services migrated online during the pandemic.

Also leaving this year is Christine Harvey, Head of Computer Science, who has ushered in many curriculum changes during her time with us. Mike Simpson leaves Bradford Grammar School after 35 years. A one-time lynch pin of the BGS peloton, Mike is a familiar figure at BGS and amongst many Old Bradfordians. He is an experienced teacher and senior examiner and has inspired many A Level students with his deep subject knowledge and love of politics. Thank you also to Library Manager, Lesley Purcell. Our Clarkson library has changed and improved of late, in no small part due to Lesley's creativity and enthusiastic leadership.

[Since recording this speech it has been confirmed to me that Michelle Harling, who has taught in the sport and religious studies departments, Sarah Howe, to whom we are grateful for providing cover in the art department, Mike McCartney, long serving teacher in the social sciences department and ardent supporter of BGS Running, and Lewis Pattison who has tended expertly to our grounds are also leaving this year. Eternally modest, he was a gifted and original artist in his own right – the kindest and most gentle man you could ever meet ... Michelle helped to run the very first girls' netball tour to South Africa and went on to assist on tennis tours to South Africa, Canada and the USA, Italy and Croatia. She was also responsible for annual junior netball tours within the UK. Michelle not only contributed hugely to netball and tennis, but in 2019 she stepped up to coach an U14 boys' rugby team, becoming the School's first female rugby coach.

For the past seven years, Michelle has been a member of the RS department, delivering the curriculum in Years 7, 8 and 9. She has also become a valued member of Debbie Chalashika's Personal Development Team, teaching challenging Relationships, Sex and Health Education topics most effectively and with the sensitivity they required.



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

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

– AUTUMN TERM 2020





They receive donations from the Bradford community to assemble food bags which are distributed by professional groups supporting those in need in the local area. About 1,500 bags each month are handed out to organisations like housing associations, advice centres, community centres, childcare providers, the probation service, doctors, ministers, imams, headteachers and various charities.

Members of the BGS Interact Club collected and packed up enough crates of food to fill two school minibuses, which the BGS Estates Team then delivered to the depot in Little Germany during half term. The food bank thanked the School for 'a simply staggering effort!'


In December, OB Peter Higgins (1981) paid a visit to BGS to promote the work of the charity Mary's Meals. Peter last visited BGS in 2015 and since then the School has supported this wonderful charity, donating funds via a BGS giving page.

Peter's assemblies to four Senior School year groups were followed by a livestreamed assembly to Clock House, and an entertaining talk for older students entitled 'How to run your own business'. He made it clear how much difference even small donations can make - in Malawi just £9 covers the cost of school dinners for a child accessing a full year's education.

Over Christmas, the Department for International Development matched all donations made to Mary's Meals, so the £3,000 raised by BGS families following Peter's visit was worth double that to the charity. The total raised by School over the past five years has now exceeded £20,500!



'How can you run a school library when you are working from home?!' This is a question which all library staff have been asked since the start of the first lockdown and it has been a challenge!


BGS is lucky to have such a fantastic and well-resourced library space in The Clarkson Library, and both library staff and students are missing being able to work and study there in the usual manner.

Bradford Grammar School Year 8 students Rugaiyah A, Eliza S, Eloise B, and Fiona L, won through to the CyberFirst Girls final as North of England champions following the fast-paced semi-finals.

The girls worked hard all day solving online puzzles about logic and coding, networking, cybersecurity and cryptography.

Christine Harvey, Head of Computer Science, said: 'BGS had entered this competition for the past three years and had never got to the semi-finals, so the girls did amazingly well. The semis were fun but challenging, with the top place on the leader board changing several times in the last few minutes. It was very exciting to win the semi-final and to represent the North of England at the national final. On finals day, we just missed out on a top position despite the girl's teamwork and determination.'

The competition was run by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), part of GCHQ. Now in its fifth year, the competition aims to inspire girls to pursue their interests in technology and consider a career in cybersecurity.

Chris Ensor, NCSC Deputy Director for Cyber Growth, said: 'It's inspiring to see girls up and down the country engaging in the competition with such enthusiasm and skill, and we hope many will consider taking their interest in cybersecurity further.'

The day after their end-of-year exams finished, Year 7 walked to Ilkley as their predecessors have done every year since 2005, with just a break for COVID in 2020.



A clever and complex production, it incorporated many elaborate theatrical elements: physical theatre, innovative staging, lighting and sound, to create a frenetic assault on the senses. It challenged us to think about life mathematically, as it wove together stories from the past and present – exploring the idea that life is fleeting but maths is permanent. We were left feeling exhausted but also, a tad more intelligent!





Open Science Lecture: 'Presentations Bevond the Matrix' – AUTUMN TERM 2020

For the first time, the Bradford Grammar School series of free public Open Science Lectures went into the virtual world. On Monday 12 October, we were treated to

a presentation by Consultant Paediatric Surgeon Mr Ross Fisher from Sheffield Children's Hospital on maximising audience engagement when delivering presentations.




Are we alone in the universe?

Athletic Development

The 2020/21 co-curricular Athletic Development Programme had over 100 students committed on a weekly basis across all year groups and sports, with the core focus to improve athleticism, physical development, literacy and longterm athletic development.

The sessions were all gym based with the aims of:

- 1. Developing key fundamental movement patterns via a 5-level movement competency tier system.
- 2. Develop strength, power, speed and change of direction via plyometrics and resistance training methods.
- 3. Build robustness and resilience so students' bodies can tolerate the demands that sport and playing/ training places upon them.
- 4. Learn to train in a gym environment safely and with structured training and purpose.

All the students were given their own training sheet to record progress, and developed nicely across the year improving technique, control and strength. Special mentions go to Bella M in Year 8 who in a short period of time demonstrated technical proficiency and physical capacity to progress, through a great work ethic and commitment. Harry L in Year 10 made great improvements in his movement capabilities and control, again through consistency and repetition of mastering the key movements, such as the hinge pattern. Caitlin R and Amber H in Year 11 have been committed students to the programme and are also taking on

a responsibility through their own experiences and the benefits gained are helping spread the awareness of the importance of partaking in physical/ athletic development focused training.

A big positive this year was that there is now a significant increase in girls and lower school participation, which looks likely to build going into 2021/22 and beyond.

The last half-term of the year we also introduced the Year 7 cohort into some introduction sessions in preparation for the following year, which had great interest and had over 25 students involved.

Athletic development continues to be delivered within curriculum sport/games lessons, generally on field/court alongside students' technical and tactical sports training and lessons to ensure every student can improve their athletic motor skill competency, physical literacy and general understanding. The aim is to not only improve their long-term athletic development and sports performance, but to provide the tools for when students go into their adult livelihood, be for general fitness and health reasons or to continue with their sporting journey and performance.



Whilst there were no national inter-school competitions, we had the biggest and strongest turnout yet at the Yorkshire and Humberside Schools Orienteering Championships, which were held at Fixby and Bradley Woods, near Huddersfield, in May. We missed out by just one point on being crowned county schools' champions; the top spot was taken by Sheffield's High Storrs School, who are one of the top three schools in the UK. At the event. Emily G won Year 11 Girls. Henry H won Year 8 Boys. Tom T was second in Year 10 Boys, Daniel B was second in Year 8 Boys, and Edwin van L was third in Year 9 Boys. BGS orienteers occupied four of the top five spots in the Year 8 Boys category, and they are looking to the British Schools Championships in November 2021, in order to defend the national trophy they won in 2019. Rugby

Throughout a very challenging year for BGS Rugby, some real positives have arisen from a season of limited action which thwarted and eventually halted the rugby season. A forced chance to reflect will hopefully leave the game in a better position once we fully rise out of the COVID nightmare.

Most year groups engaged well, in a season of masks, sanitiser and wipes! Participation rates increased in most year groups throughout the year, in both Senior School and Clock House, particularly in Years 7, 10 and 11.

The programme was challenging yet enabled coaches and players to be creative and try new approaches, in a bid to keep engagement high, whilst challenging and developing our pupils within the limitations of the COVID quidelines. The key to this seemed to be creating competitive situations for individuals and groups alike without the outlet of offline competition against other schools.

Numerous challenges were set by coaches and pupils, normally involving a physical or skill-based challenge. These were attempted at home, whilst in lockdown, in groups where possible, online or in small groups when the boys were allowed back in school. From kicking balls into bins, finger spins, rugby ball kick ups, passes to knock balls off cones, running challenges and to my personal favourite of the 'build a snowman and tackle it challenge'!

One of the larger challenges was taken on by the Year 10 and 11 2022 South Africa tourists. The boys put together the 'Big 5 Migration' which involved teams of buffalo, elephant, rhino, lion and leopard competing to cover the 7.799-mile journey in the fastest time possible! The rules allowed each team to recruit members if they donated to the tour fund. We saw fellow teachers, parents, Old Bradfordians (OBs) and even some sporting celebrities recruited, including British Lion and OB Charlie Hodgson (1999), international rugby players Jamie Noon and Tom May, and British Cyclist and OB Abby-Mae Parkinson (2014). George H even cunningly signed up OB and British Olympian Jonny Brownlee (2008)!

On reaching Cape Town, it was team captains Will B (Year 11) and Thom S's (Year 10) 'Team Buffalo' who covered 2,750 of the total 7,799 miles in just three weeks. There were 916 entries in total which proved how popular the challenge was, engaging not only the rugby players, but also other pupils such as Ben H (Year 10) who covered 328 miles personally. Mr Merckx recorded the most staff miles with 363, Mr Hahn, one of our committee parents recorded 163 miles, Miss Miller completed 139 miles, whilst the best rugby boys were Will S with 235 miles (Year 11) and Oliver T (Year 10) with 115 miles. Headmaster Dr Hinchliffe put in a solid 131 miles - well done to all and thanks for your efforts!



Going into 2021/22, the programme will be expanding further, through the employment of an assistant coach to support Mr Crichton, so that the school can provide further quality provision to even more players.

Across the half term, around 130 players competed for positions up and down the leaderboard, with the results being very close.




The next fixture was due to be against Hymers College, which was unfortunately cancelled due to rising COVID cases in the Hull area.
