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Mr Oliver, who teaches Latin at BGS, has been using the school's gym during the evening so he can fit his training around his busy teaching schedule and commute.

He is hoping his hard work will pay off on July 31 when he represents England in the 73kg category at the games in Birmingham.

Said Mr Oliver: 'I thought I'd done my last games but here I am, training for the next one. I'm really excited about taking part and thought I'd have one last crack at it.'

Originally from London, Mr Oliver began weightlifting when he was 14 when his gymnastics club converted a former broom cupboard into a weightlifting gym.

He went on to compete professionally for 17 years and has a silver medal from the 2018 Commonwealth Games and came tenth in the weightlifting 77kg category during the London Olympics in 2012.

'The London Olympics was amazing with it being on home soil. When they announced my name and I heard the crowd cheering it was fantastic, an unforgettable experience,' he said.

Mr Oliver, who joined BGS in 2018, had almost retired from the sport due to injury when in early 2021, during the pandemic, he went to the gym with a friend and started lifting again. 66....??

A talented team of runners were celebrating again after returning to Bradford as world schools cross country champions.

The teenagers competed for BGS in the ISF World Schools Cross Country Championships, in Slovakia, where the girls' team were placed first overall.

Students Rebecca F, Grace D, Emily G, Amelie L, Elsa F and Carla B, who run for clubs across West Yorkshire including Bingley Harriers, Wharfedale Harriers and Ilkley Harriers, were delighted by the result.

Meanwhile the boys' team of Joe H, Ben H, Theo C and Alex F ran their socks off to come seventh out of 13 teams across the world.

The latest girls' victory comes after the first female student in BGS's history to wear an England vest, Rebecca F, competed in the Home Countries' International Cross Country race where she won gold in the inter girls 4x1500m relay race. Rebecca gained a silver medal in the world schools cross country championships, ensuring the team took the top spot overall.

Simon Hinchliffe, headmaster at BGS, said: 'BGS runners are enjoying a fantastic season and for the girls to be crowned world schools champions is a credit to the school and to themselves. They've all trained hard to get where they are and we're incredibly proud. I'm sure they'll remember this moment for the rest of their lives.' 02 / 03

### Rugby support for #ThisIsLuke

BGS's Specialist Rugby Coach, Dan Scarbrough, was Head Coach of Yorkshire County Men's XV this season in the England Rugby Bill Beaumont County Championship 2022.

This season the championship consisted of two games with Yorkshire travelling up to Whitley Bay Rockcliff RFC on Sat May 7 to face Northumberland, followed by the War of the Roses match against Lancashire on Sat May 14 at West Park Leeds as part of the Yorkshire RFU 'Grand Day Out' played as a double header fixture with the Yorkshire Women's team.

The team won both games scoring more than four tries in each to take maximum points in the league, with Harry Boyd an Old Bradfordian taking part on the wing and scoring against Northumberland with his first touch of the ball.

Next season will see an extra match with the finalists playing at the home of rugby at Twickenham stadium.

The match supported the #ThisIsLuke fundraising efforts for an eight-year-old ex-Skipton Rugby player who lost his limbs to meningitis.

### BGS hockey coach graduates from Great Britain programme

BGS' David Birch was celebrating in June after graduating from the Great Britain Hockey Advanced Coaching Programme.

The prestigious programme only accepts 30 applicants per cohort, including 20 from England, five from Wales and five from Scotland.

Mr Birch, a Specialist Hockey Coach at BGS, has spent three years having the opportunity to further his learning, including at camps featuring various England Age Group Squads.

He said: 'I've learnt so much from it and it was amazing how much detail the coaches would give. I really welcomed the opportunity to observe them close up. The programme has been really excellent for developing my knowledge beyond what technical and tactical aspects are delivered on the pitch, I now consider the psych-social, mental and physiological needs of all players.

Mr Birch graduated at a ceremony in June at the Hockey and Tennis Centre at Olympic Park. Great Britain's most successful ever coach, Danny Kerry, who was the coach of the Rio 2016 gold medal winning side, presented David his programme certificate. He is currently studying for a Masters in Coaching at Leeds University.

The gymnasts also had a super run out at the English School Gymnastics Association National Finals. They have all been working exceptionally hard to prepare for this and secured fourth place, narrowly missing out on bronze.

The rowers have been enjoying the good weather out on the river with a mix of Saturday training and regattas across the North of England. They've competed well across the age groups against strong opposition. The whole squad has really shown what they are capable of this year with the first eight flying well in Durham and Bella M finishing 4th in the National Junior Sculling Regatta.

The tennis programme has been as busy as ever with the normal block fixture taking place alongside a mix of mid-week friendlies, Local Schools League schools' tennis festivals and the introduction of Bradford Park League Matches. The standard has been great to see with more students than ever playing in competitive matches. The all-year-round tennis programme is really having an impact on the students making sure they are ready for action come the summer months.

# Science is all around us here at Clock House...



At Clock House, science happens in all areas of the school: outside, in the classrooms, in the Senior School labs – even in the <u>Brownlee Pa</u>vilion.

One of the amazing experiments Year 5 produced this year was making paper helicopters of two different sizes and dropping them from a height, to test air resistance and gravity.

Results demonstrated that gravity pulled the helicopter down towards the centre of the earth, but the air resistance slowed it down creating a safe landing. The larger the surface area the longer the helicopter took to reach its destination, due to the force of air resistance.

Pupils discussed how the direction of the wind might have affected results and possibly, creating the experiment inside, might further improve the quality of the findings.

One of the other gripping science activities was the Poster Competition on growth, to celebrate Science Week.
