Orienteering is thriving at BGS

Orienteering is thriving at BGS, and numbers have continued to grow. We take over 20 students to fortnightly lunchtime sessions in nearby parks and forested areas.

We achieved our best ever result in October's British Schools Score Championships, in Derbyshire, winning Year 10-13 boys' team gold, and gaining four individual podium finishes: Imogen (Y7) finished 2nd, Henry (Y9) finished 1st, Joseph (Y9) finished 3rd, and Tom (Y12) finished 3rd.

In the main British Schools Championships, which was held in Sheffield in November, and which attracted more than 500 students, we finished fifth in the large secondary school competition. At the same competition, the Year 10 boys team won team silver, and we enjoyed two podium finishes: Joseph in Year 9 and Emily in Year 13. In December, we also hosted an indoor race at BGS.

A handful of our athletes are in the Yorkshire and Humberside Junior Squad, and over the summer, Henry and Emily took part in British Junior training camps in Scotland and Sweden respectively. Well done to all involved!

Sports round up

It's been a busy start to the year with many successes and lots of students fully engaged in our autumn term sport offering.

> Hockey returned with a huge number of fixtures being played. There were some outstanding performances with girls' teams coming from behind to win with ease. The indoor format was welcomed and, at the time of going to press, we had entered our first

U16 boys, national indoor competition. The introduction of boys' hockey has been a huge success and I'm sure, in time, the fixture list will grow to inspire the next generation of hockey players.

Netball saw more than 250 girls wear the navy and maroon vest this term. There is always plenty of opportunity to represent the school in friendly fixtures, national competitions and in the local Bradford Schools' League. The autumn term saw the return of the National Schools' County Round where the U14, U16 and Senior teams took to the court. Excellent performances and teamwork were shown throughout with the U14 team qualifying through to the next phase. The Netball Parents' Association, Annual Christmas Fair was a formidable success with more than £3,000 raised for future tours and for the charity Young Minds.

Rugby saw an excellent turnaround this year with some competitive fixtures across all age groups. The U12 squad started BGS incredibly well considering the majority of the squads had never played rugby before. A particular highlight was defeating GSAL with a clean sheet for our boys at Senior Level. This had never happened before. We're grateful to have such supportive parents at all fixtures and the Annual Christmas Rugby Ball was, once again, a huge success.

The **tennis** programme has been going from strength to strength and has now been opened to Clock House students. It's testament to both staff and students that the Independent Schools Council highlighted our work with Skipton Tennis Club. BGS tennis teams at every age group earned themselves spots in the regional finals with two Regional Schools' titles and two second places. Well done to the Y7/8 Girls' team who found themselves Champions of the North!

The rowers spent much of the term training hard at the river and travelled to Northwich Head Race in November. The J15s had a particularly good day with the quad finishing in second place and the girls only being beaten by excellent club crews. Another highlight was the number of students who attended the capsize drill. Better never does stop.

There was a huge take up at **table tennis** clubs and we had students representing the school in a wealth of West Yorkshire Schools fixtures. 42 boys and girls represented BGS, which is a testament to Mr Crabtree, considering table tennis is not part of the curriculum.

The swimming programme continues to grow. In October, a small contingent travelled to Durham for the English Secondary Schools Relay Championships. Faced with some formidable competition, it was the U15 Boys who shone, beating most of our local rivals, but still a touch out of the medals. We had water polo competitions with St Bede's and St Joseph's with both offering hefty learning curves, as our neighbours, who specialise in water polo, often shone through with game experience. U18s and U15s will be going into the ESSA competition.

We're proud of all students who have contributed to the sports programmes this term and we hope this continues in to the next.

Sixth Form girls represent GB in Thailand

Following a gruelling selection race in Moffat, Scotland, Rebecca (16) and Emily (17) were chosen to run for the U20 Great Britain team in the World Mountain and Trail Running Championships, in Thailand, on November 6.

Both girls spent 10 days in the South Asian country, training, acclimatising and sight-seeing with the GB team. The race itself was 6.4km in distance, 240m in elevation and the girls were competing in approximately 30-degree heat. Both girls had excellent races with Rebecca, finishing in second place overall, still smiling, while Emily somehow found the strength and determination to outsprint another athlete on the line to finish in 18th place. The U20 Women's team took the team gold medal, meaning the girls finished as world champions!

Not many people can say they are world champions, but, following their success in the World Schools' Cross Country Championships in Slovakia earlier in the year, both girls already have two world titles to their names. The future is bright for these girls, and we at BGS are proud of the athletes, people and role models they have become.

Equestrian success for Matilda

Keen equestrian Matilda H was celebrating after being placed in every class she rode in at the prestigious Horse of the Year Show (HOYS).

"I've met most of my friends through horse riding and I like competing at shows because we all see each other and can talk about the classes afterwards and who we think should have been placed. I get nervous competing at the HOYS but if I find I've got a friend there then it turns to excitement.

"Mostly you have to be calm, or the horse won't be calm. Benny has a lot of adrenaline before a class so I usually have to give him a packet of extra strong mints to keep his mind off things! I would love to win a class at the Horse of the Year Show. The highest placing I've had is second, so we'll keep working towards next year!"



Matilda was delighted to qualify for the event initially, one of the biggest in the equine calendar. She was then overjoyed to be rewarded with a 4th and 6th place in the part-bred arab and ridden show pony classes respectively on her eight-year-old bay gelding, Benny.

The Year 7 pupil has been riding since she was six months old, sitting up in a basket on horseback, and has been competing at HOYS every year since she was four. She's previously won classes at the Great Yorkshire Show (13.2hh show pony class) and the Royal International Horse Show (12.2hh show pony).

Said Matilda: "I love horse riding. I just lose myself when I'm riding, galloping across the moors.

Venus follows in dad's cricketing footsteps

Student Venus W, whose dad played first class cricket in Sri Lanka, has landed a coveted place on a cricket talent programme.

Venus, 13, plays cricket for Lancashire Women's U15s and has now been signed to North West Thunder's Emerging Player Programme, comprising female cricketers from Lancashire, Cheshire and Cumbria.

The 13-year-old, from Baildon, only started playing cricket just before her ninth birthday and was accepted into Lancashire Cricket Club Girls' team just a year later having started out playing for Esholt's Under 11 Boys' team. She was recently named Lancashire Women's Player of the Month after scoring a maiden century against Warwickshire.

Her talents have been honed, in part, by dad Ajantha, known as AJ, a spin bowler who played first-class cricket for Sri Lanka and was a member of the country's National Academy. He also played semi-professionally for different clubs across the world until a hand injury cut his career short in his mid 20s. AJ and family settled in England before Venus was born and he is now a full-time cricket coach with his own business, AVD Cricket Coaching Academy. He said: "Venus had a big interest in cricket but didn't show signs of wanting to play until much later. It's wonderful to see how much she's progressed and how much she loves it."

Venus describes herself as a 'genuine all-rounder' though she has a talent for spin bowling like her dad. She balances her studies at BGS with practising at the nets five to six times a week.

She said: "I used to watch my dad coaching in the holidays and I wanted to try it. I was the only girl there at the time but there's quite a few girls today. There's lots of banter at school because I play for Lancashire and not Yorkshire but it's all good fun."

As well as her Lancashire commitment, Venus plays cricket for BGS in both mixed and girls' teams.

BGS has been offering cricket to girls for several years with mixed teams and separate girls' teams. Year 8 pupil Lizzie P and Year 9 pupil Erin G both play for Yorkshire.

Dr Simon Hinchliffe, headmaster at BGS, said: "Venus has excelled in her cricket at BGS and it's wonderful to see her hard work paying off as she joins the North Thunder's performance programme. It's very well deserved. She follows a long line of talented cricketers at BGS."

Poppy lands singing role in touring opera

BGS pupil Poppy H-C is undergoing months of professional opera training having landed a coveted role in a major theatre production.

Poppy, 12, who has been singing and performing since she was a young girl, successfully auditioned for Opera North's upcoming tour of The Cunning Little Vixen and secured the cover role for two principal singers.

The Year 8 pupil will juggle her schoolwork with intensive rehearsals in preparation for the two-month tour in theatres across the North next year.

Poppy, from Leeds, said: "I was so shocked to be offered a soloist cover role, it's such an incredible opportunity. Full-time company rehearsals throughout December and January will be intense, but I feel very lucky to be gaining so much professional vocal training alongside Opera North's cast."

Cover singers are opera's equivalent of the Broadway understudy and Poppy will train for the roles of Pepik and Frantik, to replace the principal singers should one not be able to perform due to sickness, injury or for personal reasons.

She is already receiving professional voice coaching and, from December, rehearsals will ramp up to four afternoons a week for the young performer, who will have to take time away from the classroom.

Poppy will tour with Leeds-based Opera North from February 4 until April 1, taking the production to the Leeds Grand Theatre, The Lowry, the Theatre Royal in Nottingham, the Theatre Royal in Newcastle, and the Hull New Theatre.





A COMPASSIONATE student whose 'selfless efforts' helped support families affected by domestic violence has won an award which recognises Bradford's unsung heroes.

Faiz K, an aspiring medic in Year 13, won the 'Outstanding Student of the Year' category at Bradford's 12th annual Community Star Awards, organised by the Telegraph & Argus newspaper and Bradford Council.

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
