From the Headmaster ...

Welcome to the 2023 edition of our whole school digest, 'The Bradfordian'.

Excellence, Opportunity and Happiness - these are the words that groups of students, existing and prospective BGS families, and staff most strongly associated with BGS when a survey was conducted a few years ago.

And these three words keep rising to the surface in our everyday BGS conversations and when inspectors dig a little deeper.

Our motto, 'Hoc Age' or 'do it', describes how we behave, our daily routine - get cracking, no nonsense, a very Yorkshire existence. Excellence, Opportunity and Happiness speak to school identity and character, the things we notice when we elevate ourselves above the daily rhythm and take in a wider perspective, a longer time frame.

I'm a straightforward sort of chap and intuitively understand Excellence and Opportunity, and also 'Hoc Age'. For me, it goes something like this: make the most of your opportunities by working hard and thus give yourself a shot at achieving excellence — bish, bash, bosh. Happiness, however, is, for me, a more elusive quality.

BGS is not perfect of course, how could it be? But fundamentally, our School knows what it's about. We put our shoulder to the wheel, play fair, look after each other and try to do some good in the world. I believe there's a recipe for happiness in this simple list of BGS ingredients, but it's up to the individual to bake the cake. This latest edition of our long running annual digest, 'The Bradfordian', attests to the busy and happy lives lived at our School, and it's because of these qualities that our young people achieve so richly and highly, not the other way round.

Not for the first time, The Sunday Times named Bradford Grammar as one of the top three independent schools in the North of England and also 80th nationally. The rankings reflect exams results from summer 2022 when 92% of A Level grades were at A*-B and 80% of GCSE grades were at 9-7. Naturally we were delighted that Bradford Grammar School, and the young people of our home city and region, were recognised in this way. But league tables must be regarded cautiously, the devil can sometimes be in the detail, and they never tell the whole story. The premium we place on pastoral care, partnerships, volunteering and wider public benefit work, the arts, sport, clubs and societies - the list goes on - are sources of equal pride and speak volumes about the modern day BGS. There is synergy between our educational, commercial and public benefit activities and this has been reflected in recent recognition:



- Sunday Times: Independent Secondary School of the Year, North in 2018 and top 3 in the North 2019, 2021 and 2022.
- The Daily Telegraph: Best Value Independent Schools in the UK 2020, 2021, 2022 and 2023.
- Independent Schools Council / Schools Together: 'Celebrating Partnerships' 2021 and 2022.
- Independent Parent Magazine: Independent School of the Year 2021 for Social Mobility.
- Times Educational Supplement Independent School Awards, Wellbeing Initiative of the Year 2020.
- The Education Business Awards, Commended 2023.

But we never get complacent. When things go awry, we are open about it and look to learn and do better. Moreover, we model a kind of professional restlessness, fine tuning the strategy and sweating the details to keep moving forwards. To that end we are excited about our refurbished Sixth Form Centre, green initiatives and Junior School campus redevelopment and expanded age range to include Reception and Year 1 (opening September 2024), the benefits of which will be far reaching for the whole of Clock House.

The countless goings-on that characterise life at Bradford Grammar School are celebrated in the pages that follow. This is not an exhaustive summary by any means, but a representative impression of our wonderful School and a testament to the spirit and endeavour of our young people and staff. Read on and enjoy!

Ken was dedicated to BGS, and I hope he enjoys a long and happy retirement. We wish the same for our school nurses, Sally Martindale, who has tended to our physical and mental health for 13 years, and Maggi Ashurst who has patched us up for the past 11 years. We extend our grateful thanks to them both.

We are grateful to them all, and also to those whose time here was shorter but who will be acknowledged in the next edition of the Bradfordian magazine. And to my teaching colleagues who continue to serve our young people with professionalism, enthusiasm and a great deal of heart, you also have my deep respect and sincere thanks.

Please join me to show our collective appreciation for all BGS staff, support and teaching alike, and our leavers too, in the traditional way with a round of applause.

People matter. That's the point I wish to make at the start of my speech. They matter to me. Sometimes we might not feel like we do. Such is the disposition of busy human beings. We can miss the signals, miss a smile given, a kind word expressed, an interest shown, time devoted to a conversation. But these things show that we do care about each other, and it's the everyday interactions that speak most deeply and powerfully about life at our School for children and adults alike.

It remains a privilege to lead our School community as your Headmaster, but it's time for a little candour: I never wanted to be a Headmaster. I now see the Governors shuffling uneasily in their front row seats, possibly because I didn't use that exact phrase at interview! I freely admit that I still have to pinch myself when I remember that I am in fact the 29th Headmaster of this great institution, The Free School of King Charles II in Bradford, one of the iconic schools of the north, of the nation, with a heritage unrivalled by many that dates back to before 1548.

I don't stand here by virtue of a professional game plan or particular ambition. Neither teaching or headship featured in my thinking as a younger man or as a lad at school. But it was at school where I received the only careers advice I've ever had. I was in Year 10, the fourth form in old money, and the advice came from a very basic BBC microcomputer. Murky grey screen, green text, the computer was the size of a fridge and as heavy as one. To be honest, by today's standards, there was nothing 'micro' about this metal machine. But me and my friends, for one time only, were let loose on the thing and we tapped our information into it - academic subjects, extra-curricular interests - and waited for wisdom to be calculated.

Given the miracles of BBC microcomputer technology, the innovation of the 1980s, it was only a mere hour or two before the data was crunched and a nearby dot matrix printer chattered into life offering its faintly printed prophesy about what I was going to do with the rest of my life.

Eagerly looking for the words 'fighter pilot' or 'David Hasselhoff body double' - it was the 1980s after all - I read the name of the career to which the computer said I was best suited. Top of the list, I kid you not, was the word Zookeeper! And here I stand, as the 29th Zookeeper of the Free School of King Charles II in Bradford. Perhaps the machine had some foresight after all?

So, no great 'headmagisterial' ambition? But I have always applied myself wholeheartedly and without complaint to the task at hand. I have always been keen to embrace a challenge, to risk failure, to seize opportunity. I work hard, not for reward, but because the work I seek is meaningful and fulfilling in its own right. The thornier challenges are often the most satisfying ones, and I am grateful for them. My CV, my page on LinkedIn, does not chart deliberate preparation for the next office, but rather a seeking out of new experiences, an appetite to be busy and a disposition, perhaps, if you read between the lines, to have a laugh along the way.

Young people in the room, if you are listening, this is a different kind of careers advice to the printout I received in the 1980s. I am encouraging you, our students, to keep an open mind about what you might do in life. I am also extolling the virtue of industrious and meaningful work and reassuring you of the lasting benefits and abiding sense of achievement that comes naturally when a job is done well. We gather today to celebrate learning. To my mind, and given all I've just said, there is a clear synergy between learning and leadership. Both represent opportunities for challenge, personal growth, fulfilment and fun, and to make a positive difference in this world.

Learning and leadership can create the conditions for others to thrive. This is the legacy of both, if enacted wisely. Choose to do the right thing, then work hard. It's a simple but potentially far-reaching message, and not a million miles away from our age-old school motto of 'Hoc Age'. Those who align most closely with this ethos, students, staff, parents, Old Bradfordians and wider stakeholders alike, will inevitably get the most out of their association with our historic school.

And we do achieve great things together.

This year The Sunday Times once again rated Bradford Grammar amongst the top three independent schools in the North of England and 80th nationally. Our students achieve highly year on year and it's the consistency that counts. This of course is a wonderful reflection on the ambition, spirit and honest graft, including during the lockdowns of recent times, of our students.

Academic league tables must however be regarded cautiously, the devil can be in the detail and they never tell the whole story. At BGS we place a premium on our pastoral care, partnership, volunteering and wider public benefit work. The arts, sport, clubs and societies, the list goes on, are thriving too. Our children also enjoy school and that means a great deal to us.

The Daily Telegraph said we were one of the Best (Top 10) Value Independent Schools in the UK. The Independent Schools Council and Department for Education held up our public benefit partnerships with Future Transformation, a technology charity, and most recently Skipton Tennis Centre, as examples for others to follow. The Independent Parent Magazine named us as the Independent School of the Year for Social Mobility. The Times Educational Supplement awarded BGS with the title of Independent School of the Year for a Wellbeing Initiative. But we never get complacent and keep looking to improve, for example with respect to our Junior School campus development and expanded age range to include Reception and Year 1, opening September 2024.

This is the stuff of BGS life. Our young people, our supportive families, my colleagues and Governors, our OBs and wider circle of friends deserve the plaudits as we walk the talk of our whole school values of Excellence, Opportunity, Determination, Compassion and Service. Our School delivers an extraordinary education within a prudent commercial envelope. If a job's worth doing, all aspects of it are worth doing well. Back to 'Hoc Age' again!

There is however a counterpoint. As we strive for excellence and increments of improvement, the ideological and economic climate in which we operate represents a deepening challenge.

Schools of all kinds continue to do great work on behalf of their young people and are far more diverse in character than any binary - maintained versus independent / state versus private - caricature. The European Convention on Human Rights was established in the aftermath of the Second World War, the first protocol of which protects a parent's free choice in the education of their children reflecting religious and philosophical convictions. The convention explicitly protects plurality in education in the UK and across Europe and was initially conceived to limit the reach of the state. Let's hope that such plurality and freedom can be protected in years to come.

Our School, our BGS, is in fine shape, and it needs to be. The capacity and propensity of future generations of parents to choose independent education for their children is of national interest. It's a good job that BGS is in a strong position. However, as alluded to previously, we cannot afford to take our foot off the gas. We will not become complacent. Our School has changed and adapted over the years to maintain a robust position. We are doing so again in increments to ensure that a first-class BGS education is available to the widest possible cross section of families. Enhancing our provision, controlling costs, attending to income streams, raising funds for means-tested Assisted Places and enacting a wider public benefit, these things are essential if our School is going to thrive in the future. Such is the stuff of modern-day, independent school leadership and life.

I am proud of our young people, proud of our School, proud of our home city and region. I am proud of our resilience and adaptability to meet challenges and make the most of our opportunities. Our steady commitment to high academic and ethical standards, to providing a rich variety of experiences, is a recipe for success and happiness. Moreover, we are generous and seek to share our time and resources as a good neighbour in our community. This is BGS, this is our bedrock and our future.

When a characterful crowd of OBs, an undefeated First XV from the early 1970s, met recently in the 'Mucky Duck' and then, black tie on, in the DH Room, they said the following about BGS. They said that our School had inspired, and I quote:

'Pride in ourselves and in our shared spirit of community... [inspired] learning and leadership... [inspired] our shared vision of a desired future... [inspired] determination to grow and achieve, no matter at what age. The community in this room, [they said] the memories herein, the sadness and triumphs, the togetherness, it's all built on that magical foundation stone inside every boy and girl at Bradford Grammar School ... this is not a school, gentlemen, this is a force of nature'

And on that note... thank you for listening to me and I hope you enjoy all that follows.

My thanks go to Mrs Jones and her team of PE teachers and sports coaches who offer such a comprehensive programme to the pupils in the Junior School.

There has been much activity also with music and the arts with the ever-popular House Music Competition and wonderful Spring Concert. I hear on the grapevine that Year 4 are forming a rock band! Perhaps you will be up here performing in a year's time? The nativity play and recent Year 6 production in the Hockney Theatre had confident performances on the big stage!

Each year group has been on at least one day trip, Eden Camp, West Yorkshire Wildlife Park and Nell Bank to name a few, and who can forget the whole school excursion to see Jack and the Beanstalk at the Alhambra Theatre in December - some even got to travel on a double decker bus!

Karin Murach

After 36 years at BGS, the indomitable Karin Murach is finally hanging up her gown.

Generations of Old Bradfordians (OBs) have benefited from her first-rate academic credentials and her humorous yet exacting teaching style. One of only a handful of women on the staff when she joined BGS in 1987, and the only German native speaker for most of her career, every OB remembers the legendary 'Frau Murach', whether they were taught by her or not. It's amusing to witness grown professional OBs, now in their 40s, bringing their own children to open events and reverting to their 12-year-old reverential selves on meeting Frau Murach again!

Although some pupils may have felt intimidated in her presence at first, once in Karin's care they soon learnt that by working hard they could earn her approval and pupils universally respected - or eventually submitted to – Frau Murach's rigorous standards. The result of this is the impressive number of successful linguists who have progressed to German-related university courses and careers, all of whom speak of Karin with affection. On oral exam days, nervous candidates were often suitably distracted by Frau Murach's German tradition of 'spitting' over their shoulder and incanting 'Toi, Toi Toi!' for good luck.

The luckiest pupils were those who went on school trips with Karin, especially to her native Berlin. Having grown up in the East before the fall of the Berlin Wall, Karin shared invaluable memories of GDR times, providing an inestimably rich experience for her pupils. Karin remembers taking one group around the former Stasi HQ Museum, only to realise that it was the very building in which she had herself been interviewed in a sound-proofed cellar as part of the process of marrying a foreigner and leaving East Germany in 1985.

Karin was always keen to promote the love of language learning and gamely dressed up in her dirndl and hat on Open Days and European Day of Languages, memorably showcasing her dance moves one year in BGS' Eurovision Song Contest video.

Those fortunate enough to be in Frau Murach's form knew the great care and attention she put into getting to know her tutees and her gentle empathy with those who were more naturally reticent. Her written reports and university references succinctly and sensitively reflected the essence of each pupil, in prose more eloquent than many English-speakers!

To her colleagues, Karin was one of the warmest and most caring people you could hope to work with. She took great interest in others, especially if they were going through a difficult time, and her kind gifts and thoughtful touches were always a tonic.

The Languages Department will be the poorer without Karin. She really has been the backbone of the team, especially in recent years, and we will miss her cheerful morning round of conversation and acerbic comment. It feels like the end of an era; it is no coincidence that the word which pops up most regularly in remembering her is simply a 'legend'.

Bradford Grammar students celebrate outstanding results

Bradford Grammar School students celebrated achieving outstanding results in their A Levels on 17 August, with the vast majority looking forward to places at their first-choice universities.

More than half of the A Level grades were A^*/A , with four out of five grades at A^*-B .

The following week, on 24 August, the celebrations continued as GCSE grades were higher than prepandemic levels with almost three quarters of grades awarded being 7-9 (previously A-A*).

More than half (52 per cent) of the GCSE grades were 8-9s compared with 47 per cent in 2019, pre the COVID pandemic. Likewise, 94 per cent of the grades awarded were 5-9, compared with 92 per cent in 2019.

Headmaster, Dr Simon Hinchliffe, said:

'We're proud of our students who achieve so much academically and beyond in the realms of sport, arts, public service and a rich diversity of interests... It clearly demonstrates that with the right support, such as we have at BGS, you can thrive inside and outside of the classroom without compromise.'









Team GB swim star Leah achieves grade A success

A young Team GB swimmer who has her eye on the Paris Olympics was celebrating a different win - her fantastic A Level results.

Leah S, has had to balance her studies at BGS with being one of the country's leading young swimmers.

Her hard work paid off with an A in Maths, A in Chemistry and A* in Biology. She now plans to take a year out to focus on her Olympics bid before taking up a place at the University of Nottingham to study medicine.

Leah said: 'I'm looking forward to being able to completely focus on training and give qualifying for the Paris Olympics my best shot. I know it's going to be hard, but I have a chance. It would be a dream come true.'


Leah began swimming when she was seven and swims for City of Leeds Swimming Club. Her recent successes include winning Gold in a record-breaking time in the 200m Individual Medley at the European Junior Championships in Belgrade, in July.

It follows her amazing haul at the British Swimming Championships, in April, when Leah smashed several personal bests and gained two senior Bronze medals – in the 200m IM and 400 IM.

Leah would get up at 4am, four times a week, to train for two hours before school followed by another 2.5 hours of training after school every day.

She said: 'It has been tough to fit in training with studying for A Levels but at least I've had free periods and I'm pretty good at switching off. Many of my friends at swimming don't have access to a pool at school either!'





Teenager who missed 18 months of school celebrates top GCSE results

An inspirational teenager celebrated gaining nine top grades in his GCSEs after undergoing treatment for blood cancer and other health issues throughout most of his academic life.

Seb M, has faced ongoing health challenges since he was first diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukaemia (ALL) at just three years old.

But, in the face of chemotherapy, immunotherapy, radiotherapy, a stem cell transplant and spinal fusion surgery, the determined teen successfully managed to keep up with his studies at BGS, with support from his family and friends at the school – and during the COVID pandemic thanks to a robot on loan from Leeds General Infirmary (LGI).

His hard work and determination paid off when he received A grade equivalents across the board with one 9, five 8s and three 7s. Seb is now looking forward to starting his A Levels in Psychology, Business, History and English Literature at BGS.

Said Seb: 'I'm really pleased with my results - it's more than I expected.

'It's been a really rough journey. But the support of my family, friends, and the school has kept me strong, and I've had a lot of support and good care from the hospital. I just take everything one day at a time.'

Seb endured 3.5 years of chemotherapy after he was first diagnosed with ALL. After nearly five years in remission, Seb learned the devastating news that his leukaemia had returned in December 2017. On Boxing Day, he was admitted to the LGI to start a gruelling in-patient course of chemotherapy. Sadly, this time the chemotherapy did not work, leading to Seb having to trial a more experimental immunotherapy treatment to get him into remission. He was told he would need a stem cell transplant to be cured. None of his family members were a match, leading to a world-wide search for a suitable donor. Finally, a German donor was identified and, in April 2018, after a week of radiotherapy twice a day, Seb received his life-saving stem cell transplant.

That was one of the worst times of my life,' he recalled. 'I had six weeks in hospital isolated from everyone because my immune system had been wiped out. My parents took alternate nights to stay with me. I was very sick and I had no energy so I was sleeping most of the time. I even had to learn how to walk again. I missed over 18 months of school during my treatment and recovery, but I was determined not to have to drop back a year, so I kept up with my studies at home.'

During his treatment and subsequent shielding during COVID, his studies were boosted by a robot on loan from the LGI which sat in lessons for him and beamed the action back to Seb's tablet at home.

I was shielding for quite a while because of COVID and so my friends and other people in the year group would take the robot and move it around for different lessons,' said Seb. 'I'm also very grateful for the support of my teachers who did live Teams lessons for me to access at home which enabled me to keep up with my learning on the days I wasn't well enough to get into school.'

While Seb has staged an inspirational fight back, he still has health challenges. The stem cell transplant and the toxicity of the cancer treatment has unfortunately left him with some severe chronic health complications which have had an impact on his ability to access education. One complication is chronic graft versus host disease (GVHD) of the lungs which means Seb is having to function on only around a third of his normal lung capacity. It has a significant impact on his energy levels and stamina. He takes a combination of different medications on a daily basis to treat his ongoing health conditions. Most recently, after completing his GCSE exams, Seb had spinal fusion surgery at the LGI to correct scoliosis which had developed during his cancer treatment.

Despite all this, Seb successfully managed to sit all his nine GCSEs.

He added: 'I would advise anyone in a similar situation to just keep on going, keep working hard and stay positive.'

Dr Simon Hinchliffe, headmaster, said: 'Seb has shown a huge amount of courage and determination to keep up with his studies in the face of such tough health issues and gruelling treatments. We are very proud of him, he is a credit to the school, and we look forward to supporting him as he pursues his A Levels in September.'

As part of Science Week, the children enjoyed a science fair organised by our team of STEM ambassadors.

























Music roundup

Robin is now looking forward to helping the school's leadership strengthen its relationships with Old Bradfordians, and the wider BGS community, and contribute her expertise to expand the already successful 1662 Campaign for Assisted Places.

A compassionate student whose 'selfless efforts' helped support families affected by domestic violence has won an award which recognises Bradford's unsung heroes.

BGS's Head of Chemistry, Rob Moody, has been teaching chemistry for 15 years, in the state, FE and independent sectors. He explains why he loves to share his passion for 'blowing things up' with the wider community through his chemistry outreach roadshow.

I've loved science for as long as I can remember. A great thing about chemistry, and one of the things I enjoy doing, is showing off! I'm so lucky as a chemistry teacher because when it comes to it, we can always start blowing things up! I say this as a joke, but it's true!At Christmas for example, instead of watching a film in lessons as a treat, I like to set fire to things — I love doing the exciting stuff.

As I've trundled through my career, I've built up a repertoire of demonstrations that me and my students love doing, and over the last 20 years I've also been lucky enough to go to demonstration lectures, where experts do exciting things with various combinations of chemicals. With these in my arsenal, my love of science keen to be shared, and a chat with the headmaster, we agreed to celebrate our strengths and share this passion with others. It was from here that the chemistry outreach roadshow was born.

My first chemistry outreach activity was just before the pandemic. I trialled it at my daughters' school, The Wharton's Primary School in Otley for Years 5 and 6 (with the addition of my daughters who were lower down the school but insisted they wanted to see it!). And it was a great success – I loved it, the staff loved it but most importantly, the children loved it. I did a spontaneous combustion experiment which culminated in a burst of flames! I also did some simple, large scale colour changes which is great for interaction and participation. Launching rockets across the school hall is also another fun experiment which the children thoroughly enjoy.

The roadshows are also about being hands-on. It's not about just knowing a load of stuff. It's about doing and being able to do. And science is for everyone. It's doing. It's not about sitting and passively learning new facts. It's fun, interactive, and engaging. It's all well and good watching an experiment on YouTube, which many children like to do, but if we take something like the elephant's toothpaste experiment for example and show it to a group of primary school children, it's better seeing loads of foam squirting everywhere and hitting the ceiling live and in person, than it is seeing it on a screen. It really makes a difference in how science is experienced.

My latest roadshow was last year for Year 5 and 6 pupils at Lindley Junior School in Huddersfield, and I'm hoping to go back again this year as they've invited me back to deliver my 'show' to the latest cohort of Year 5 children. I'd love to take my little chemistry roadshow to more schools – it's just finding the time to fit it all in!

Alongside the outreach programme, I have also been involved with the Otley Science Festival. During my first visit, I blew up some hydrogen and people loved it. So, I did it again last autumn, but this time I had a larger space, enabling more visitors to do more hands-on chemistry. We made pH rainbows which most of the younger children hadn't experienced before. Younger and older children, plus adults all took part and a great time was had by all.

I also share my love of science via TikTok where I share demonstrations, experiments, science facts and jokes on a platform that older students engage in. My GCSE students particularly love it. They love that I'm occupying a space in their world - in an educational and non-invasive way. It's on their terms if they want to watch my content and they find it rather amusing. I like the idea of a bit of chemistry sneaking in between the likes of Taylor Swift and Justin Bieber (or whoever is famous nowadays)! If I can make chemistry fun in a short and snappy way or remind someone that they have a piece of homework or revision to do, then it's all worth it.

I know it sounds daft, but I just want children to like chemistry. I want students to turn up in my room on the first day of Year 7 and be so excited about chemistry – I want them to know it's going to be great and interesting.



French at Frizinghall

Years 8, 9 and 10 are taking part in the data collection project Born in Bradford – The Age of Wonder, along with other young people from various secondary schools in the Bradford area.

Pupils will give their views in four surveys which ask about their outlook on life, their feelings on the pandemic, and their thoughts on the use of technology in the modern world. They will also provide physical data about their height, weight, cognitive and motor skills and blood samples.

As part of the project, Winifrid Robinson, who presents BBC Radio 4's You and Yours programme, visited the school in January to interview pupils about young people's mental and physical health and the effects of the pandemic on their teenage years. The programme aired in February.

Pastoral prefects

- SPRING TERM 2023

Kai D and Laiba H are two of 20 pastoral prefects at BGS. They talk about their roles and how they help their younger peers navigate school life.

What made you want to become a pastoral prefect?

Kai: I liked the sound of the 'pastoral prefect' role rather than being on the 'school prefect' team because it gives you the opportunity to help others. I knew it would lead to more training, so if people came to me asking for help, I would be able to support them. I also thought I'd learn skills which would be useful in life.

Laiba: I joined BGS in Year 9 and I was really shy. It took a while to make friends and settle in. It was a difficult time. One thing that really helped was Mrs Wilde introducing me to a Year 12 who had come to BGS from London. She spoke to me about how difficult it was for her to move. I really liked that idea of having other people in a similar situation to talk to. Being a pastoral prefect means I can help younger students in the same way.

What was the application process like?

Kai: We had to write a short piece on why we wanted to be a pastoral prefect. I was really happy when I was selected.

Laiba: We had to apply for the role of prefect and then all the teachers and students voted for the applicants they thought would be good. I was shocked and delighted when I found I was going to be one.

What training did you undertake?

Kai: We did a Mental Health First Aid course at the start of the year which talked about the importance of listening, gave training on how to give advice and how best to help someone who's having a problem, such as by signposting them to the right support.

Laiba: It was really good because it taught you how to deal with specific situations and how to act without making someone feel nervous so they would be comfortable to speak. Jo, the School Counsellor, also did some training with us to give us confidence about mentoring younger students.

What does your role involve and what do you enjoy about it?

Kai: We have meetings every other Friday to plan what we will be doing with the younger year groups and discuss assemblies and activities. We can also meet with the counsellor whenever we need to so, if we have any problems or anyone who needs referring, we can ask her for advice. At lunchtimes we run a regular boardgames club and invite students to come along. It's a far better way for kids to come and talk to us, especially if they're shy. It brings them out of their shell. The games club is also fun for us!

Laiba: I love games club too — everyone does! It's the same people who come most days and we encourage pupils who might not find it easy to socialise at lunchtime to come along and join in too. We also lead assemblies as part of our role and are delivering these to the whole school in each of the Wellbeing Weeks this year. I'm a Year 8 prefect and I'll be taking an active role in speaking about wellbeing in Year 8 assemblies, covering topics such as healthy eating and the importance of students looking after themselves. We also help with things like Anti-Bullying Week and Safer Internet Week.

What kind of issues do students need to talk about?

Kai: Bullying – online or in real life – advice about exams and life post lockdown are common things.

Laiba: For many of them it's friendship issues or loneliness, they may not have a lot of friends and be a bit shy. We can offer a listening ear for that and encourage them to meet new people through the games club.

What are the benefits of having pastoral prefects?

Kai: It's nice for students to be able to talk to someone who's close to their own age. Everyone is studying different subjects so they're there to give advice on what they're good at. I think it's easier to come to a Sixth Former and have a chat rather than speak to a teacher sometimes.

Laiba: When you speak to a teacher it feels more official and much more formal. It's a lot less pressure to be able to speak to a peer, particularly if they've gone through similar things. We have a good variety of people and we've all got different interests which is good. We all work together well.





LEGO® Challenge success

BGS pupils of all ages made it through to the national finals of a major LEGO® robotics competition for the first time in the School's history.

The team of ten, comprising pupils spanning Years 7 to 12, had been practising for weeks after winning the regional finals of the Institution of Engineering and Technology's (IET) FIRST® LEGO® League challenge.

Pupils had designed and built a robot to carry out a series of challenges. Although they suffered a nail-biting robot malfunctionon the day of the finals (22 April) at Harrogate Convention Centre, the team battled through to seventh place with their back-up robot.

In addition, they won the Bechtel Award for Safety for their innovation project, for promoting safety in the community. Pupils created a CO2 measuring device to be placed outside schools to encourage drivers to turn off their engines and improve air quality. They also ranked fourth in the STEM project phase.

Zaina M, in Year 8 said the team had grown together as friends over the months working on the project.

'I'm really into computing, it's fun, and there's also a lot of banter in the group which is great,' she said.

Easily the most poignant moment of the assembly followed as William C gave a moving piano and vocal performance of Queen's 'Bohemian Rhapsody' during which the whole theatre sang along, phone lights aloft! Meet Nida

- SUMMER TERM 2023

Nida B joined the BGS Sixth Form in September 2022 'due to the school's incredibly appealing academic achievements and co-curricular opportunities on offer.' She is studying A Level Maths, Politics and History, the latter being her chosen subject for university. Nida has also recently completed the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) and is keen to share it's benefits with other prospective EPQ students. This is what she said:

What is the EPQ and why should people take it?

In essence, the EPQ is a 6,000-word dissertation about an independently researched topic of choice. It is much more than merely word counts and academic writing though. It is an opportunity to go beyond the curriculum and study a topic of your own choosing. An EPQ is also an invaluable opportunity to learn about yourself as a student. It enables you to really consider whether your interest in a subject area is sustainable and strong enough for you to pursue it further at university, etc. An EPQ is also helpful to establish a routine for how to carry out research, which is a learning opportunity. Consequently, I also used this personalised routine for a research competition I've participated in since. I think the most appealing factor of taking an EPQ is that you gain many tangible skills, such as critical thinking and improved communication skills, something which enriches your entire academic journey, for example, in my A Level History. Another unique benefit of taking an EPQ is that many universities may lower their entrance requirements as a means of recognising and appreciating these extra skills.

What was your EPQ about?

After much consideration, I chose to investigate the following question: To what extent did the protests of the youth impact the civil rights movement in the USA in the 20th century?'. I chose this, although rather spontaneously, because the civil rights movement is something I've always been interested in.

What exactly did you have to do?

My EPQ started in September 2022 and ended in Spring 2023. The first assessed piece of written work I submitted was the Project Proposal Form (PPF) in which I outlined and justified my plans. Another key element of the EPQ was the activity log which had to be consistently written in throughout the EPQ journey, although, at times, this was a slight challenge to keep up with. In the end, I really enjoyed writing the log as it was a useful means of reflecting on my progress on the other written components (introduction, literature review, main body, conclusion, references, evaluation and abstract, the latter not being included in the 6,000-word limit). I analysed lots of academic journal articles and books. Organising and referencing these was a bit difficult at first but it quickly became second nature. The final part of the EPQ is the presentation which is performed in front of an audience including family and friends, as well as the assessors. To my surprise, although I was very nervous, the presentation was the most fun part of the entire EPQ. As the evening commenced, and I presented my findings to various groups of people, my nervousness was replaced with calmness, and I enjoyed talking about my work, including to family and friends.



How did it feel to lead your own project?

Leading my own project was a unique and valuable experience. As well as developing my own critical thinking and problem-solving skills, I strengthened my sense of self-responsibility, whether this was through using my study periods productively or implementing my tutor's advice. However, the idea that you must do everything yourself when doing an EPQ is a slight exaggeration, help is always on hand. Throughout the EPQ I had regular 1-1 meetings with my EPQ tutors enabling me to control my own timetable and test my ability to stick to deadlines.

As well as these meetings, teachers provided a lot of support through resources, whether it be a hard copy of an academic phrase bank or pre-recorded guidance on referencing. Teachers were always there to help.

What piece of advice would you give to someone thinking about taking an EPQ?

Do not overcomplicate things. I think the key difference between getting an exceptional grade or not comes down to listening to your teacher's advice and implementing it. This can only be effectively done if you communicate your worries clearly, so don't be afraid to admit your weaknesses or request help when needed. Another thing is to leave sufficient time at the end to edit your work properly – so don't procrastinate at the start. Overall, I think the most important thing is to enjoy your topic.

A few words from A McOwen, Head of Sixth Form Enrichment & EPQ:

'Nida engaged deeply with the existing literature within the field, synthesised her findings into arguments that addressed a range of factors and perspectives, before reaching a clear conclusion that recognised the implications of her final judgement and recommendations for further research. Nida delivered an engaging presentation, which revealed a genuine interest in the topic and meaningfully reflected on her EPQ experience. For these reasons, Nida was amongst the highest-achieving EPQ students this year. I thank her for sharing her reflections on the EPQ experience with a wider audience. It was a pleasure to supervise her throughout the process.'




Farewell Frau Murach



Fewer than 15 per cent of the UK has ever skied so a ski trip is a great opportunity for our students to be able to take to the slopes.



Mr Joe Brook, a student at Bradford University, appeared at the Lady Hale Court in the city on 24 May charged with assault as a result of a prank gone wrong.

Hockey returned with a huge number of fixtures being played. There were some outstanding performances with girls' teams coming from behind to win with ease. The indoor format was welcomed and, at the time of going to press, we had entered our first U16 boys, national indoor competition. The introduction of boys' hockey has been a huge success and I'm sure, in time, the fixture list will grow to inspire the next generation of hockey players.

Netball saw more than 250 girls wear the navy and maroon vest this term. There is always plenty of opportunity to represent the school in friendly fixtures, national competitions and in the local Bradford Schools' League. The 13-year-old, from Baildon, only started playing cricket just before her ninth birthday and was accepted into Lancashire Cricket Club Girls' team just a year later having started out playing for Esholt's Under 11 Boys' team. She was recently named Lancashire Women's Player of the Month after scoring a maiden century against Warwickshire.

Her talents have been honed, in part, by Dad Aiantha, known as AJ, a spin bowler who played first-class cricket for Sri Lanka and was a member of the country's National Academy. He also played semi-professionally for different clubs across the world until a hand injury cut his career short in his mid 20s. AJ and family settled in England before Venus was born and he is now a full-time cricket coach with his own business. AVD Cricket Coaching Academy. He said: 'Venus had a big interest in cricket but didn't show signs of wanting to play until much later. It's wonderful to see how much she's progressed and how much she loves it.'

Venus describes herself as a 'genuine all-rounder' though she has a talent for spin bowling like her dad. She balances her studies at BGS with practising at the nets five to six times a week.

Rebecca came 23rd, leading her Under 20s women's squad to 6th place overall at the championships in Bathurst.



This success means we will be ranked inside the top 20 schools in Britain for tennis next year. 


Tennis

The 2022-23 academic year has been a real stand out one for BGS tennis. The programme caters for around 70 pupils taking tennis sessions each week and this has been our first year expanding into Clock House, now giving Year 4, 5 and 6 children the opportunity to take lessons.

Tennis is now a key component of the Clock House curriculum, and this is giving our pupils access to experienced coaches, fantastic facilities, and more hours on court from a young age.



Over the autumn and winter terms, both Senior teams were entered into the LTA Year 11-13 cup. The boys were drawn in Northern Group E with local rivals Woodhouse Grove and St Peters. The latter are always tough competition, however the team of Morgan H, Will B, Shishir S and Haris M proved far too strong, coming away with a 12-0 win. Woodhouse Grove were more manageable opposition, and the boys had no trouble securing a win against them. This meant that the team qualified from their group and progressed to the regional knockout. The team were due to play Altrincham Grammar School, however due to mocks, the match date got pushed back and on the date we were due to play there was a freak snowstorm! This meant that the match had to go to a coin flip by the LTA. We unfortunately came out on the wrong side. A very harsh way to miss out on regional finals.



The Year 11-13 girls were drawn in Northern Group F, with Lancaster Royal Grammar and Clitheroe Grammar. Unfortunately, Clitheroe were not able to fulfil their fixtures, so the girls were awarded a walkover. The match against Lancaster Grammar however was a much tighter affair. After singles the match was 2-2 with Olivia B and Hannah G winning their contests. After doubles the match was still tied, which meant a tiebreak shootout to 10. Hannah G and Anna B were selected to play. The tiebreak went back and forwards with the girls going 9-6 down. After keeping things steady, they managed to pull it back to 11-9 to BGS. With this the girls qualified for regional finals. The regional finals were hosted at Sunderland Tennis Centre over a full day. The level at regional finals was very high. There were some excellent individual performances but not quite enough to come away with any team wins, resulting in the girls coming fourth. Making regional finals will mean that the girls have achieved LTA schools ranking points, putting us amongst some of the best tennis schools in the UK.

Summer Competition

The 2022-23 summer term competition calendar was the most extensive BGS tennis season to date. Having recently registered as a tennis club, this allowed us to enter club competition as well as school tennis competitions.

The highlight of the School's tennis season was the Glanville and Abadere Cups which are the national championships for boys and girls. This year our girls reached the regional finals, losing out to a strong St Peters team. Their run in the regional final included a nail-biting match against Pocklington that went to 3-3 after singles. Jameela T and Amelie B managed to pull off a 11-9 win to secure victory. The girls then beat South Hunsley School. Considering this year was made up of only one senior, they will continue to develop and come back stronger next year.

The boys team also had an excellent run to the semi finals of the regional round. They came up against Birkdale in their first round who had an excellent young player at number one. Morgan H battled hard and managed to win a tiebreak. In the same match, Innes M also came through in a tiebreak, with Innes and Haris' doubles also going to a tiebreak.

The boys showed good character to come through. Their next round was against Ampleforth. The team played a superb set of singles to 4-0 up, showing their match experience. In the semi finals we came up against a very strong llkley Grammar. The match took four hours to complete with every point being incredibly tight. The team ended up losing 4-2 with three of the losing matches going to 11-9 in the tiebreak. One or two points the other way and the team would have made it through to the finals against a St Peters team who we had beaten before.

Bradford Parks League and LTA national league game play has exposed all our players to an appropriate level of competition.

After winning both the U15 and U18 Bradford Parks League last season, the goal was the repeat the achievement. Having such a great depth of players across all age groups certainly helped the teams maintain a strong level week in, week out. The U18s dominated the league stage of the competition, going undefeated all season. The main players in this team were, Morgan H, Will B, Shishir S, Haris M, Reuben H and Lucas A. In the finals stage of the competition, the BGS team saw off Cleckheaton and Skipton Tennis Club to claim the title.

The U15 team saw a superb variety of players take part ranging from Year 6 to Year 10. Even after extensive rotation of the squads, the team managed to win the league with a team of Jameela T, Henry S, Daniel B and Ameen J, bringing home the trophy after a strong day at Ilkley Tennis Club beating Cleckheaton and Ilkley in their finals matches.

2022-23 was the first year we have entered the LTA Summer National League. This league pitted us against most of the big tennis centres in Yorkshire, providing quality competition for our more advanced players against county and regional level opposition. We entered four teams in the competition. U11 boys, U14 boys, U18 girls, U18 boys.

Oliver M, Laith G and Ralph H made up the U11 boys team and they achieved a superb second place finish. Christian B-V, Zack B and Ameen J made up the U14s boys team and they placed fourth in their league.

Jameela T, Ava R and Anna B made up the U18 girls team who placed fourth in their league. This was an excellent achievement considering Jameela is in Year 7 and Ava in Year 10. Their performance against Goole, particularly the doubles, was a highlight of the season, dominating around the net.

Morgan H, Haris M and Shishir S made up the U18 boys team and they finished in fifth place in a very strong division 1. Shishir's three set marathons stand out as some of the best performances of the season with some his matches lasting well over two hours.

2022-23 was also the first year that BGS has entered both division 1 and 2 LTA schools team tennis. The performances of the teams over the season were a testament to their hard work over the term. BGS teams managed to win both divisions of every age group. Division 1 teams will progress to the regional knockouts with a chance of reaching LTA team tennis national finals, whilst division 2 winners will progress to the regional finals where we hope to retain our U13s girls and U15s boys regional titles and go one step further in the U13s boys and U15s girls who came runners up last year.



Individual achievements

Across the year players have been competing individually outside of school, improving their skills and their rankings.

Jameela T has had an excellent year winning 16 events in and outside of her own age group. This has pushed her ranking inside the top 50 in Britain which is an excellent achievement and BGS first.

Ava R has transitioned into U16s and managed to win two tournaments. This has pushed her ranking up into the top 800 in the UK and is steadily rising as she continues to work hard.

Ameen J, Henry S, Christian B-V, Harry S, Laith G, Zack B, Oliver M, Shishir S, Morgan H and Haris M have all picked up points in the various events which puts them on the LTA rankings table.

The BGS tennis programme continues to develop a reputation around Yorkshire, with more and more players playing tournaments and competing regularly. This year's achievements, when the rankings are released, should push BGS inside the top 20 ranked schools for tennis in the UK.

2022-23 has been an excellent springboard for our players to access the correct level of competition and gain an understanding of the standard of tennis out there. As we move in 2023-24 more experienced, we are hoping for an even stronger year.


Netball
