Sporting Highlights

The term started strongly with numerous pre-season activities in preparation for a packed calendar of fixtures and events in the autumn term.

30 boys headed to North Wales on a rugby camp that comprised of training as well as a team building and quarry karting session. At the end of the trip, they attended the King's School Macclesfield Festival playing four matches against opposition from across the country.

Following the successful summer tour of South Africa, the senior girls' hockey team attended the Nottingham High School Festival. They competed well in every game, progressing all the way to a final. True 'Hoc Age' spirit was on display throughout the tournament.

There was national success in the opening weeks of term, as Amelie L won the English Schools U18 Fell Running Championship, hosted at Giggleswick School, with Martha J finishing fifth after a strong return to the fells. This running success was capitalised on later in the term as the senior girls' team gualified for the National Finals. Amelie added to her Fell Running success, taking first place in the qualifying race for schools in the North of England. The girls were bolstered by the returning Rebecca F for the National Finals at Woodbridge School towards the end of term. Rebecca claimed first place, with Amelie a respectable third. The efforts of Martha J, Carla B and Phoebe M, ensured a landslide victory for BGS in the final standings.

In Orienteering, 30 students from Years 7 to 12 enjoyed a joint orienteering and cross-country trip to Leicestershire in October. The main focus was the British Schools Score Championships which took place in Martinshaw Woods, Groby. The Year 10 to 13 boys retained their British title from 2022, and the Year 7 to 9 boys and girls also stood on the team podium. Captain and Year 13 student Tom T and Year 11 pupil Henry S both earned individual silver medals, and Year 7 pupil Ben R went one better to clinch gold.

During half term, the Year 9 netballers went on tour to Disneyland. Day one consisted of a masterclass, with expert coaches and day two was tournament day. Both teams did extremely well, setting standards high and encouraging one another. After some close fought matches, against some strong opponents, our B team were placed third in the Plate competition, after winning the third/ fourth playoff with a golden goal! Our A team had an incredible afternoon, progressing through to the final. The girls stuck to the task in front of them, winning 13-7 and being crowned Showdown Cup Champions.

The girls celebrated their successes exploring Disneyland. To top off what had been an amazing day, that evening the girls continued their celebrations at the awards evening. Later in the term the U14 squad had further success qualifying for the regional rounds of the National Netball Cup. The U16 squad also got in on the action, qualifying for the next round on a great day of netball where BGS hosted all three competitions in the barn.



The U16 girls tennis team reached the LTA National Schools Finals in Bolton for the first time in BGS history. The team made up of Jameela T, Katy H, Ava R and Evie S, acquitted themselves with distinction to finish fourth overall. The highlight was an excellent team effort against King's High School, Warwick.

The amount of sporting participation and performance has been staggering this term, with 'Hoc Age' spirit at the heart of it from pupils, staff and parents.

Equestrian success at the Horse of the Year Show

Two students enjoyed huge success after taking part in the largest equestrian show in the UK calendar.

Lucinda L and Tilda H both competed in the prestigious Horse of the Year Show (HOYS) at the National Exhibition Centre in Birmingham in October.

Year 10 pupil Lucinda competed in two classes at HOYS – the 14hh Working Hunter Pony of the Year on Rose and the Junior Large Breeds Pony of the Year on Harry, a Connemara pony.

Lucinda won and went champion on Harry which qualified her for the Supreme Championship, riding against the winners of all the other show classes. It followed success earlier in the week when Rocky, who Lucinda won the Open Section A of the Year on last year, was also in the Supreme this year ridden by her brother.

Said Lucinda: "I was thrilled to win the Junior Large Breeds Pony of the Year and become champion on Harry and it was beyond my wildest dreams to be in the Supreme Championship, among the best of the best. I never thought it would be possible to ride in the Supreme Championship at HOYS with my brother, it was an experience of a lifetime." Tilda in Year 8 qualified five ponies for six different showing classes, ranging from Junior Small Breeds Pony of the Year to 138cm Show Pony of the Year.

She said: "I was really pleased with the way all the ponies performed. HOYS has such a high standard and it's a privilege to qualify and compete there. I was especially pleased to be placed 9th with Robin, at only my second show with him, and 2nd with Edward, against other competitors much older than me, some even up to the age of 17.

"It can be nerve-wracking for a 12-year-old girl to enter a ring where everyone has their eyes on you, however, I've gradually become less affected by nerves. I've developed many strong friendships along the way and I also love the proud feeling I get when I know I've improved, even just from one ride or from over the years."

'Faiths in the City' day on Wednesday 18 October was a day of collaboration and exploration as pupils explored religious responses to compassion, generosity and hospitality.

The event was richly rewarding and stimulating for our pupils, celebrating and exploring the richness and diversity of faith in our community.

The annual event invites faith leaders from the local Bradford and wider Yorkshire community to lead our pupils through a variety of activities (which focus on exploring our theme), such as dance, musical performance, art, and drama. The workshops this year included a Hindu dance workshop that performed Bharatanatyam, a classical Indian dance style. Year 9 were certainly put through their paces! In one of the Christian workshops led by 'Riding Lights', pupils performed their own dramatic sequences as well as explored the work of this theatre group and their Christian witness. The other Christian workshop explored the Christian approach to compassion and generosity through discussion and reflection, with reference to biblical stories and teachings focusing on hospitality.

The Islamic calligraphy workshop was led by Zareena who inspired our pupils to make beautiful traditional calligraphy designs.

We embarked upon our European adventure on Thursday 19 October and travelled to the beautiful city of Colmar in the Alsace.

Year 12 and 13 students took it in turns to enquire about transport links, seek directions to food establishments and book tickets. We spoke to waiters in French, customs officials in German and bus drivers in both! When in Rome ...

What a treat for all staff and pupils! With an early morning start, leaving BGS at 2.45am on Wednesday 25 October, our journey to Italy and ancient Rome was just beginning.

A very excited school group of Religious Studies and Classics students arrived in a warm and sunny Rome, where our busy schedule began in the ancient port of Rome, Ostia Antica and then continued underground into the Catacombs of Saint Sebastian (of which the Necropolis, an ancient city of the dead was a particular marvel). A very busy and full day ended with a lovely restaurant meal in the heart of Rome.

On our second day we began with an unforgettable experience of the Metro in Rome and managed very skilfully to navigate a very busy commuter train! Underground was a theme to the beginning of our day, exploring the wonders and eccentricities of Nero's extravagant Palace, the Domus Aurea and then travelling to the dizzying heights of the Victor Emmanuel II monument, pausing to learn about and reflect on the tomb to the unknown soldier, guarded by Italian marines. Pupils were able to practise their Italian and order lunch, while Dr Reeson ordered lunch with ease in fluent Italian! Our afternoon was another busy exploration of ancient art, symbolism and culture of Rome in the Capitoline Museum, moving to the Borghese Museum, exploring the power of the sculptures of Bernini and the art of Caravaggio.



With each day being crammed full of activity, our last full day was no exception. We started with a tour of the Colosseum followed by a tour of the Roman Forum, followed by more Metro navigation to the Vatican Museums which took our breath away as we walked down corridors of statues, paintings, artefacts and the beautiful frescos of the Sistine Chapel. It was a trip of adventure, discovery, sensory overload and great excitement – thank you to all staff and pupils for making it a trip to remember.

Future Innovators on the Factory Floor

On the morning of 12 October, Year 12 set off on possibly the closest educational visit on record. Making the 10-minute walk down Frizinghall Road to Ernest Cummins Printers, the A Level students were excited about seeing the industrial application of the design theory they were studying at the time.

Over the past four years, the DT department has taken the opportunity during Bradford Manufacturing Week to visit the local factory to complement the 'Paper and Boards' unit. On the surface this topic may not sound overly exciting, however teaching is complemented by hands-on experience as well as industry insight and a design competition judged by a leading senior designer at UK Greetings, a Dewsbury based greeting card design studio.

Visiting the Ernest Cummins factory allowed students to compare printing processes such as digital and offset lithography as well as finishing techniques including foiling and embossing. Seeing the machines running as well as speaking with the staff who maintain the operations and oversee quality control, embedded their theory knowledge by bringing it to life.

It is important that we provide these opportunities for students to see manufacturing taking place and be exposed to people and places they may not normally come into contact with.

One participant, Sebastian R in Year 6 had this to say:


