


"From June to August last year,
I took part in the Quantum in

University. It was a study to show
that high school students can

only taught to undergraduates.

It was brilliant to officially open the new Cardiovascular Gym Suite above the Sports Hall. This project was generously supported by the Parents' Association and was orchestrated by Mr Nabozny sourcing state of the art equipment and curating artwork, featuring some of our Old Bradfordians who have had success on the Senior, Professional and International sporting landscape, to serve as inspiration to our current aspiring athletes.

In hockey, the boys' season has had an excellent start. The 1st XI mounted an impressive Independent Schools Hockey Cup run defeating QEGS Wakefield and St Peter's School, York, before bowing out to a superb Yarm School outfit in a tight, high-quality encounter. There has also been festival action across the age groups with BGS squads progressing beyond initial stages in all instances. The girls 1st XI also secured a landmark victory for the first time over Cheadle Hulme School at home.

For the first time BGS were one of few schools with both U14 and U16 squads in attendance at the Yorkshire Regional round of the National Schools Netball Cup. The U16s put in a gallant effort facing tough opposition during to finish sixth in Yorkshire. The U14s played superb netball during the day falling agonisingly one goal short of the top two places to qualify for the national rounds. All pupils and staff should be proud of their efforts enabling them to compete on the regional stage.

The rugby 7s season has started apace with only the U15s not having played a tournament (due to cancellation). The highlights have been runners up performances for the U12s and the U16s at the Pocklington 10-a-side festival and champions at the Wirral Grammar School 7s for the 1st VII in a flawless display.

Spring Term Sporting Highlights

Since returning from the Christmas holidays there has been an incredible amount of sporting action packed into the first five weeks of term.

Away from team games there has been success in the pool for BGS Aquatics, notably a significant victory over local rivals Woodhouse Grove, with senior students managing the teams and administering the races in a true demonstration of BGS values. There was also a large cohort of BGS runners representing Bradford Schools at the West Yorkshire finals. The senior girls tennis teams moved through to the next round of the cup with strong victories over Wakefield Girls and GSAL on a busy afternoon in the Barn. In the week before half term BGS played host

to the West Yorkshire Table Tennis Finals. In an immense effort by Mr Crabtree the sports hall was filled with tables and competitors from across West Yorkshire hoping to be crowned champions.

We now look forward to the summer term, which will see cricket, tennis and athletics take centre stage.

Not to be outdone, the U13 mixed team dazzled judges with a synchronised routine, clinching the top spot and earning the prestigious Yorkshire champions title. They now qualify for the National Finals to be held in March.

The Young Carers' mentoring scheme has made a very welcome return to Bradford Grammar School, after the pandemic and external funding cuts made it unfeasible to run successfully for the past couple of years.



Every Monday evening, a dozen Young Carers from across Bradford come to spend time in our Sixth Form Centre to receive tuition and mentoring from Year 12 volunteers. Our volunteers offer them academic as well as emotional support, as well as advice on how to revise effectively. This not only improves the young carers' grades, but also gives them confidence in their own ability and, for a short time, they can focus on themselves and not who they are caring for at home.

The two hours are mutually beneficial, as our students have developed useful tutoring and mentoring skills. One pupil who volunteers with the programme said: "I have thoroughly enjoyed my experience with the Bradford Young Carers scheme as it is incredibly fulfilling to help other people and it has helped me to gain confidence when speaking to new people as well as developing transferable skills that will be useful in later life as I am aiming to become a teacher."

The programme will continue running until April.


Spotlight on ... Photography Society



As an artist and photographer, I take pride in capturing the beauty of nature and light, usually as close-up photos. 
Round up of Life at Clock House

Ethan's Cross Country Journey

Ethan P is a Year 5 pupil and talented sportsman. He is a successful runner, holding the school records for Year 3 300 metres and Year 4 600 metres. In recent times, he has started to achieve great things in the long-distance running category and as such he has been interviewed about his cross country journey.

Ethan's mum noticed that he was a fast runner from a very young age. When his family lived in London, he went to Junior Parkrun every week which is a 2k race. Ethan also used to attend an athletics class at the Sir Mo Farah Training Track at St Mary's University in Twickenham, near to where he used to live. When he moved closer to Bradford, he began running for the West Yorkshire club, Ilkley Harriers. Although he didn't begin running in West Yorkshire competitions, Ethan still trained hard, practising up to seven days a week, running twice on Wednesdays and sometimes on Sundays, and resting on Thursdays and Fridays.

Below are some of his responses to a recent interview. We wish Ethan and his team continued success for the future:

At what age did you begin long distance running?

I was eight years of age.

Have you had any successes in recent races?

I have! I finished first in an interschool XC race and third in the Bingley Harriers Schools XC races back in September. I came 14th in my most recent West Yorkshire league race. The West Yorkshire league is made up of some of the fastest runners from each of the local clubs. I run in the under 11 category which is both Year 5 and Year 6, so I'm one of the younger runners. In the last race, I came 14th out of approximately 40 runners.

How often do you train?

My running schedule varies a lot but includes Parkrun, a 5k race on a Saturday morning. My best time for this is 21.59.

What club do you run for? I run for the Ilkley Harriers.

Do you want to be a cross country runner when you are older?

I may do. I'm also considering being a sprinter, but you never know what the future will bring.

Have you ever achieved higher than West Yorkshire (e.g., county, national)?

I'm hoping to get to Yorkshire next academic year.

Do you recommend cross country to others?

If you have good stamina and know when to pace yourself, yes, but if you don't, it will be tiring.
