

HEADMASTER'S UPDATE

Dear Old Bradfordians and friends of BGS. Welcome to this latest OB newsletter. I write these words in the midst of exam season. GCSE and A Level papers are being sat down the corridor in the hushed Price Hall. Meanwhile, internal exams for Years 9 and 10 proceed in the Sports Hall – my own daughter is tackling these. I hope all has gone well today or else the headmaster's evening at home could be a decidedly frosty affair!

Exams are, however, just one part of a routinely busy BGS life. Articles on our news page (Latest News – Bradford Grammar School) provide a snapshot of recent comings and goings at School. Additionally, if you haven't had an opportunity to leaf through our latest Old Bradfordian magazine please do so, it's a terrific read with much that will be of interest (Old Bradfordian magazine – Bradford Grammar School). The Spring term edition of our tri annual school magazine, Hoc Age (Hoc Age – Bradford Grammar School) speaks to the breadth of the BGS experience. The next, Summer term, copy of Hoc Age is in production and will be shared in due course. It opens with the following lines from me: "You get a strong feeling for what BGS is all about, the difference it makes to people, its substance and significance, when attending Old Bradfordian, alumni events. Happily, there have been quite a few recently.



For example, we enjoyed a 'sell out' social near St Paul's Cathedral recently to mark 40 years since the first girls were welcomed at BGS. OBs of various vintage, including many recent leavers, gathered in good spirits to renew and strengthen friendships and forge new ones. Mrs (Jane) Chapman was in attendance, and she kindly shared a few words about her long relationship with BGS as a teacher, and mum and wife to OBs. Mrs Chapman retires at the end of summer term, and she was the guest of honour. There is great strength and warmth in our extended school family, and these qualities reflect formative experiences in the classrooms and corridors, fields and theatre, labs and library – the list goes on – at BGS. There is something special about our School."

We will celebrate Mrs Chapman's contribution at BGS when we gather for our annual Prizegiving and Speech Day. The activity and achievements of our pupils will, as always, be the focus of proceedings; but we will also touch upon some of the issues of the day, reflect upon BGS and the contexts in which it operates.

The potential imposition of VAT on the fees paid by parents, and removal of Business Rates Relief on the bills paid by the school, represent a double-edged financial sword. Such things are on the minds of those who choose to send their children to an independent school and those of us who choose to work at one. But, as you might imagine, we do not stand idle in the face of challenges. Continued progress in support of our 1662 Fund for means tested Assisted Places and exciting enhancements to our Junior School, including the addition of Reception and Year 1 and new woodland adventure play and learning infrastructure, are examples of developments to secure the character and attraction, inclusivity and positive impact of our school. Meanwhile, prudent business practice continues. The Senior Leadership Team and Board of Governors will take all necessary steps to enable BGS to thrive for the benefit of generations of school children to come. We take a long-term view of our legacy. That said, it would be foolish to assume that the challenge is anything less than acute. I am grateful to those OBs who have used their networks and platforms to make the case for BGS and our peer group of schools.

WELCOME TO OUR NEW OLD BRADFORDIANS




The Year 13 Leavers' Lunch in May provided our sixth formers with a welcome break in their A-Level revision and a chance to celebrate their School days with friends and family.

EMILY GIBBINS (2024)

In April, Emily Gibbins won the W20E (women's under 20 elite) race at the British Middle Distance Orienteering Championships, held in Otley.

Emily's victory builds on her other achievements such as being W18 British Night Champion in 2022 and representing England in an international competition in Belgium in 2023. She was also part of the BGS team who won the World Schools Cross-Country Championships in 2023.

Geography teacher David Alcock, who runs the school's orienteering club commented: "Emily was a fairly late starter to the sport, and she has successfully built on her crosscountry running training foundations to pick up the complexities of navigating at speed and on rough terrain. We are very proud of her achievements."

Emily is now juggling the challenges of orienteering training with the demands of studying Geography at Durham University, though is aiming for more international vests in the future.

MEET NATALIA DANNENBERG-SPREIER

In 2024, we celebrate 40 years of women at BGS. We caught up with Natalia Dannenberg-Spreier (1999) who joined BGS in the Sixth Form to find out where life has taken her beyond the school gates.



Natalia left BGS armed with her A-levels and drive to succeed. A Leeds girl, Natalia continued to study languages (namely German), with a plan to be an International Lawyer, however at the University of Nottingham Natalia directed a play in German and realised that her creative side was calling. Subsequently, back in the early 2000s, she changed career direction and wrote to 23 production companies for a job. She got one acceptance as a runner, which she duly took and her TV career began; one Natalia looks back on with fondness.

"I started as a runner on an astronomy show called 'Stardate' and moved onto history and science programmes such as 'Time team' and 'How do they do it?'. It was a wonderful time full of adventures and amazing people. I found myself down South African mines, flying onto an icebreaker ship by helicopter in Canada and crawling around under Egyptian pyramids."

Around this time, Natalia also found her German husband. The calling to move to Germany came and the need for stability saw Natalia move to Bonn, and work in broadcast journalism, furthering her love of the media, news and the German language. Despite living and working abroad, she remained in close contact with her BGS peers.

"School gave me two things – lifelong friendships and resilience. It's when the chips are down and the bumps in life come you realise just how important having both are. BGS was certainly a character forming school and I would say that the experience gained there absolutely helped me see light and positivity when the setbacks in life happened."



For the last 13 years Natalia has been working at the International Paralympic Committee, firstly leading the social media and editorial team, then as the Head of Brand & Engagement. Alongside having three children, her career progressed in an intense role where Natalia and her small team were instrumental in creating public shift in perception, transforming attitudes towards Para athletes through the Paralympic Games. The highlight was most certainly the London Games.

2024 - CELEBRATING 40 YEARS OF BGS GIRLS

"London 2012 was a game changer in terms of how we shifted the dial; we really didn't foresee the groundswell of warmth and enthusiasm for the Paralympic Games. We worked tirelessly; 20-hour days living off adrenalin, with coverage on every national paper, across all social media platforms and strategic partnerships boosting everything we did. It was the year the Paralympics and Paralympians truly became cool."

Fast forward to 2024 and ahead of the Paris games, aside from developing the brand for the Games, Natalia has been tasked with a new role as Head of Paralympic Heritage to bring together the history of the International Paralympic Committee, the Paralympics and athletes to a global audience. A role Natalia is keen to develop and after 13 years at the IPC, a legacy she is driven to deliver.

EMILE'S HOME RUN

We are always very proud of our OB's achievements and inspired by how Hoc Age runs through the blood of all our alumni. None more so than back in April when Emile Cairess (2016) ran his second marathon on home turf to finish 3rd out of 50,000 runners in the 2024 London Marathon.

Emile is the first British born runner since 1996 to attain a podium position. This result also gained him an automatic place in the Paris Games. We are very much looking forward to watching him race in the Olympics in a few weeks and wish him the best of luck from all at BGS.



A TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE

DAVID LOWE (1966)



David Lowe (1966) still vividly remembers the excitement of joining Bradford Grammar at the age of 9. "It was a real sense of pride." He remarked. "Just before joining School we took a family holiday to Scarborough where I insisted on taking my school uniform and wearing it along the promenade."

Coming from a musical family, David was gifted piano lessons as a reward for passing his exams, so when he arrived at BGS, playing the school organ became a core focus and an interest that stayed with him through life. In the early 60s, having organ lessons with the school's music master Leslie Walsh, David looked forward to Saturday morning assemblies, taking to the organ and playing the school's traditional programme to 1000 children, sharing the duty with one or two other boys.

Musically, times were changing, pop music was dominating the airwaves and the Beatles had very much arrived. David recalls one Saturday morning incorporating 'Michelle' into the assembly programme, which he thought had gone unnoticed, until being given 'the look' by his Master. An unspoken word between them said that such an improvisation was not required again!

Whilst studying at BGS, David became aware of the prestigious Wurlitzer which was housed at the Bradford Gaumont (later known as the Odeon – the newly restored – and soon to be re-opened – Bradford Live). David was allowed to practise after school for three hours at a time and eventually was asked to audition for a job, playing pre-show preludes and organ interludes, complete with spotlight and raising platform – quite the accolade in the days when the City's concert hall was a central form of entertainment for miles around.



David remarks that his school days were instrumental to his personal development and enabled skills for life. "As well as harnessing my love of the organ, what I also gained was an in-built confidence that transcended through my career. I was taught to speak publicly at a very young age, which helped me play to a regular audience of 3000 at the Gaumont."

After school, David went on to enjoy a career playing to thousands more at ice rinks and concert halls across the UK and the world; he subsequently followed a different career on the railways and running the family canal business. Indeed, he considers himself a very lucky Old Bradfordian with a wealth of musical memories and life changing experiences growing up in Bradford.





ALUMNI EVENT REPORTS SWIMMING AND WATER POLO GALA

There was a great turnout on 16 March for the annual Old Bradfordians event, with OBs and BGS students participating in the annual Swimming and Water Polo Gala at the Adrian Moorhouse Pool. Old Bradfordians spanning decades came together to challenge the current students in the swimming whilst, more importantly, hanging on to their title of Water Polo champions. A title they've had since 1984.



Medley relay started the swimming off. The OBs put forward their strongest team with Tim Hobbs on the Backstroke, Hugo Stonelake on the Breaststroke, Reece Hunt on the Butterfly and Tom Stenhouse on the Freestyle, managing to narrowly beat BGS. The next event was the 100m Freestyle, Nigel Wilson and Tom Stenhouse swam for the Old Bradfordians but were both pipped by the school swimmers. Rhys Hunt won the Butterfly race, followed by a win from Tim Hobbs in the Backstroke and Harry Palmer coming second. With two relays to go, school were winning 42 points to 40. The determination and strength of the students ensured a BGS win with 68 points against Old Bradfordians who scored 53 points.

The OBs, however, were yet to have their finest hour, with the opportunity to achieve a 40-year title looming in the Water Polo competition. The team which, in part, was made up of English Schools Senior Champions from the 1980s (Stephen Moorhouse and the Nixon brothers) was also supported with younger talent to bring the title home. Whilst there were a couple of early goals from the Bradfordians, the OBs ensured a comfortable win and a final result of OBs 13 – BGS 5. Looking back on the day, Specialist Swimming Coach, Craig Robinson, commented: "It was fantastic to welcome back four OBs from the class of 2023, who brought some youth and energy to an aging OBs team, and who certainly spiced up the competitiveness of the swimming competition."

OB organiser Mike Nixon was delighted with the OBs performance and aims to build on their success in 2025. The OBs are looking to recruit and to retain their water polo crown, whilst increasing their swimming times. In addition, female OBs are asked to come forward and create a female team to take on the BGS girls for the first time.
