#### HEADMASTER'S UPDATE

Dear Old Bradfordians and friends of BGS, Welcome to this latest OB newsletter. Much has happened since the last time I wrote. Let's start with the good news... Summer term concluded well with a busy schedule of concerts, trips, sport fixtures, Speech Day and various end of year celebrations. It was at this time that we also sought responses from parents to a triannual survey, following the ISI (inspection) template.

The survey revealed a high degree of satisfaction with BGS, particularly with regard to the breadth of curriculum, pupil progress, physical activity and the range of co-curricular activities, feeling safe and respected, and also leadership. When put alongside our recent Good Schools Guide report (<u>BGS Shines in The Good Schools Guide Review</u>) it is self-evident that BGS remains in decent shape. But we don't get complacent.

Once term ended, an extensive plan of summer works began. Much was achieved including office and classroom refits, realisation of a new Special Educational Needs hub, (part of a much wider expansion of provision in this field), pool repainting, boat house refurbishments, window replacements, alarm upgrades, roof repairs, lighting improvements, server and extensive re-cabling work, planting and pitch renovations, the list continues and as ever this is just a flavour of the things that go on, often unseen, but always appreciated, over the summer.



We also had hugely successful sports tours to Sri Lanka and Canada for our netball and rugby teams respectively, as well as an ambitious expedition to Morocco, CCF camps and a pre-season hockey tournament at Nottingham.

The summer 'break' is a busy time at BGS, and beyond campus improvements, trips and tours, there were some exam outcomes to crunch, communicate and celebrate where appropriate. Results and UCAS services were as busy as ever over the summer, as was marketing and student admissions activity, development and fundraising work for those vital means tested Assisted Places, staff recruitment / induction / training processes, facilitation of Governor activity, financial planning, public benefit work and, of course, preterm preparations in departments, support and teaching, and much general administration in advance of the resumption of lessons.


BGS keeps me busy and, for the most part, out of trouble! I like it that way. And, as ever, I am inspired by my colleagues who invest a great deal of their time and energy in making BGS the wonderful school it is for our pupils.

In terms of those aforementioned exam results, over 50% of all GCSE grades were at 9/8. Over a third of GCSE students scored an average of grade 8 or above. Just under two thirds of students scored an average grade of 7 (old GCSE 'A' grade) or above. At A Level, our Year 13 cohort secured a 100 per cent pass rate with one in five grades awarded being an A\*. These are very strong outcomes in the context of both groups of young people and any reasonable levels of expectation placed upon them – pleasingly, added value is something that has improved over recent years.

Much has happened in the wider scene too, not all of it good news for BGS...



VAT on fees and other cost pressures, including the loss of Business Rates Relief, will have an impact on BGS given our catchment and context. As I wrote in a recent <u>blog:</u>

"The imposition of VAT on fees paid by parents who choose to send their children to an independent school has been debated extensively, and the nation spoke emphatically on this matter at the ballot box. BGS and our peer group schools will naturally respect the outcome of the election. VAT it seems will be paid from January 2025, an early start date in the estimation of many".

To be clear, BGS, in common with our peer group of schools, has no political affiliations and will work with any colour of government that seeks to work constructively with us. But we are not naive. Some families are now being forced to withdraw their children from BGS and schools like ours. More will follow. I have grave concerns regarding the education and wellbeing of these young people. Meanwhile, other parents who would once have considered BGS will no longer be able to do so. These changes will bite incrementally over time.

That said, BGS is an efficient and effective business, and we will strain every sinew to meet new challenges without compromising our standards. Crucially, in this moment of mounting pressures, I continue to extend my gratitude to our benefactors. Through their support we are able to protect Assisted Places for bright and deserving young people from disadvantaged backgrounds. This is our vision and purpose, with opportunity, excellence and positive impact at the core of all we do.

And on we go, with belief in our work, striving to make a difference for our young people and trusting to the support of Old Bradfordians and the wider BGS family. Enjoy reading all that follows, the things that make our school community so special, and I look forward to the pleasure of your company at future OB events.

#### <u>GENEROUS DONATION TO</u> <u>SUPPORT STUDENTS WITH</u> <u>LIMITED MEANS</u>

An anonymous benefactor has given a significant donation to Bradford Grammar School, allowing several children from a range of backgrounds to take up transformational places. Seven new Year 12 students have been awarded Assisted Places thanks to the donation, where they will receive an outstanding education and be inspired to dream big and reach their full potential.



It brings the number of students who have been awarded APs at BGS this year to 14, with much of the money generously gifted by the school's Old Bradfordian alumni via its 1662 Campaign. Two of them, a Year 12 and a Year 13 student, have also received scholarships from the Rank Foundation's 'School Leadership Award' which has supported 1,500 pupils since 1978. The students attend a leadership event in each of their Sixth Form years, take part in regular online meetings and spend two weeks in the summer holiday working for a non-profit organisation. The students also receive financial support.

One AP recipient, Zinedine Meah, in Year 12, said: "The opportunities I have at BGS go way beyond the curriculum. I'm a member of the Politics, Bio Med and Debating Societies, all of which are setting me up for my future. I'm grateful to those who support the 1662 Campaign and thank them for enriching my life in immeasurable ways."

The recent benefactor, who wishes to remain anonymous, said: "BGS provides a transformative education; it offers an environment for students to thrive and achieve their full potential.

According to the English Indices of Deprivation, Bradford is the fifth most deprived area in the UK with 22 per cent of children living below the poverty line.

The school has recently launched the 1662 Campaign Ambassadors programme, where benefactors come together to discuss ways to sustain and increase the number of Assisted Places at BGS.

Anya Friis, Head of Development at BGS, said: "BGS has a long history of social responsibility, offering talented and hard-working children from disadvantaged backgrounds the opportunity to reach their full potential.

#### HOLLYWOOD PRODUCER AND OB RETURNS TO SCHOOL FOR PRIZEGIVING

OB Umar Hussain (2010) who worked his way up to become a visual effects producer on Hollywood blockbusters was the guest speaker at this year's Clock House Prizegiving ceremony.

Umar returned to inspire the next generation of film fanatics where he told his young audience that the organisational skills he picked up at school, along with the ability to 'ask the right questions,' had served him well in his career.

Umar left BGS in 2010 and went on to study Politics, Philosophy and Economics at Manchester University before becoming an intern on the reality show Made in Chelsea.

He then got his big break working as a visual effects production coordinator on the Guardians of the Galaxy film and through persistence, drive and making the most of every opportunity, rose through the ranks to become a visual effects producer.



Now Miami-based, his credits include Star Wars Episodes VII, VIII and IX, Jurassic World, Fast & Furious, Doctor Strange, ABBA Voyage and one of his favourite films, The Lion King. Umar, who enjoyed a tour of his old school and chatting to pupils about his job, said: "I enjoyed my time at BGS and it's so nice to be back and to be able to speak to current pupils.



"As well as the impressive new technology on offer today, personality counts. BGS is such a lovely place to learn and being polite and empathic has got me far.

"My father, Zulfi, always said, 'if you don't ask, you don't get' and I took him at his word. You'd be amazed how many times people will help if you ask them nicely."

Richard Ribeiro, Headmaster at Bradford Grammar Junior School, said the children had loved learning about Umar's work.

"We're really grateful Umar took time out of his busy schedule to inspire all our pupils. He's shown them exactly what you can achieve with his determination to move upwards, then working hard when the opportunities came his way. He's a fantastic role model for them and we've loved showing him around."

#### REMEMBERING OLD BRADFORDIANS AND THE FIRST WORLD WAR

Many Old Bradfordians will remember Head of History, Nick Hooper (2015). Mr Hooper, who has had a lifelong interest in the First World War, and led school battlefield trips for 25 years, has been back at School recently to help produce a video in collaboration with Bradford Through The Lens videographers, Riaz Ahmed and Graham Swain.



A project that began in 2014, Nick has always enjoyed researching and uncovering new stories about our wartime Old Bradfordians and has written over 200 biographies of those who died during, or as a result of, their war service.

Commenting on this project he said: "Preserving the memory of our Old Bradfordians and their stories has been at the heart of this project. In 1922, as a school we said we would honour those who lost their lives and 102 years later – here we are – keeping the promise."



#### FOUNDERS DAY 2024

Bradford Grammar celebrated Founders' Day at Bradford Cathedral in October and as pupils congregated, they were reminded of School's rich heritage and how it was built on philanthropy and inclusivity.

BGS pupils gathered to celebrate School and its history, from 1548 and the days when it existed as The Free School of King Charles II, through to 1870 and being one of the first schools to adopt the Forster Education Act reforms, becoming a secular school within the local board of education.

Head Boy, James Woodham reminded us of those that have supported the school to make it what it is today, giving thanks to our benefactors and philanthropists such as Samuel Lister, former Headmaster William Keeling, Douglas Hamilton, Sir Ken Morrison and others.

It was also a time to remind our pupils that they too may walk in the footsteps of fellow Old Bradfordians and want to give back – ensuring that BGS remains a school built on inclusivity – so that others, regardless of background, may also benefit from the same exemplary education.

#### WHERE ARE THEY NOW? BLAINE THOMAS (2020)



We caught up recently with Blaine Thomas – one of our younger Old Bradfordians who, following his time at BGS, is about to embark in the world of work upon completion of university life. Blaine secured a place at Bradford Grammar having been awarded an Assisted Place, funded by a donation established in memory of the late Sir Ken Morrison.

When Blaine joined BGS in the 6th Form back in 2018, he was expecting a culture shock moving to an independent school from growing up on the Canterbury estate in Bradford. But the reality was somewhat different to his expectations of a grandiose building and a stuffy, uptight environment.

"Teachers and students were friendly from the outset, which meant I was able to settle quickly. I was surrounded by teachers who wanted me to do well and other students who also wanted to do well and this combination was the motivator to be the best I could possibly be." School provided some important groundwork for a career in law; opening opportunities and relationships with established lawyers, some of which are Old Bradfordians who have supported the journey.

Fast forward two years and Blaine, armed with three top A Levels, was accepted into Oxford University to study Law. He eased into Oxford life and credits BGS for enabling this smooth change.

"Moving from a non-traditional background to a top university – from Bradford to Oxford – would have been a tough change. The university required a quick transition and a focus on independent study. BGS gave me that cushioning and preparation for what would be three years of intense learning in a high-pressure environment. It meant I could hit the ground running without feeling shell shocked."

During those university days, Blaine was able to fully embrace the opportunities that came his way. He met with various law firms, took an internship and was offered places in multiple international practices upon graduation. Safe in the knowledge that he would become a trainee corporate lawyer, Blaine decided to fulfil another dream and took a leap of faith, travelling for 6 months across Asia.

Today, Blaine is living in London and is about to start his professional life at international firm Slaughter and May. Whilst West Yorkshire may seem a world away, the Bradford boy who is close to his family still visits often. He also meets with other OBs, including BGS classmates, and is forever grateful for the opportunity he was given back in 2018.

"The family you were born into shouldn't be a barrier to success. I am grateful for the chance I had at BGS to engage fully in my studies and school life beyond A Levels. The opportunities that were offered to me at school changed my life and there are so many bright talented students across Bradford who also deserve the same opportunities. Supporting the 1662 campaign for Assisted Places will ensure more children in West Yorkshire get their chance to thrive."

### AN EVENING AT THE THEATRE

Actor and OB John Hollingworth (1999) has been busy performing on stage these last few months. Over the summer, John played Antony in Shakespeare's Antony and Cleopatra in a bilingual production at the Globe, which was also supported by fellow OBs who spent the evening on the South Bank. John has taken up a new role for October and November at Hampstead Theatre playing a Yorkshireman and Hull Trawler Owner in the world premiere of Richard Bean's new play 'Reykjavik'.

In a recent interview with The Stage, John commented on his Northern upbringing: "I grew up on benefits in Yorkshire and got an assisted place at Bradford Grammar School, which had a fairly metropolitan accent." Hollingworth says. "Now, I make money playing posh guys. I think a lot of casting directors don't even know I'm from Yorkshire."

#### TRAIL RUNNING FOR THE UK



## <u>AMELIE LANE (2024)</u>

Bradford Grammar School has a history of producing runners to represent GB and one of our stars is Amelie Lane who has spent the season competing for England and the UK in the European and World Mountain and Trail championships. The highlight of her season was a Team GB race at the European Championships in Annecy where the team secured two silver medals in the Uphill and Mountain Classic races. It was a different race back to BGS the next day, to sit her Geography A Level. Amelie started racing seriously in Year 8, with the support of parents and close BGS friend and fellow all-round runner, Rebecca Flaherty.

"I started running when I was 10, my parents would encourage me and reward with an ice cream at the end of every race. My dad runs with me now, though he is too slow! I also thank Rebecca who has been a constant source of inspiration over the last few years."

Post A Levels, Amelie – who is one of our most recent Old Bradfordians – is taking a break from studies to concentrate on running and the season ahead, though she will take up a place at Durham University to study Biology next year. Training takes place through Winter and Spring up in the Lake District, in the Alps and daily runs close to home on Ilkley Moor.

This year Amelie is upping the distance from 7km to 15km races as she moves from the Junior to a Senior category. We will share Amelie's progress throughout the season.

### NORTHERN COLLEGE OF MUSIC AWARD



Our congratulations go to OB Ruby Hendry (2017) who has been awarded the Sybil Tutton Opera Award to support the funding of a second year Masters Degree at the Royal Northern College of Music (RNCM).
